Give Seafoods a Part in Your Weekly Menu

It was not so long ago that Americans living inland looked forward to a trip to the seacoast because it gave them their only opportunity to enjoy seafoods.

Now, however, the development of the chain store system of merchandising and distribution has brought fresh seafoods to the door of the homemaker living 1,500 miles inland.

Today, when everyone is so nutrition conscious, seafoods receive special attention. Fish are valuable for their high content of mineral salts. For the inlander the most important of these is iodine, an essential to glandular health.

Here are three recipes from Marion Rouse Rudd, director of the A. P. Kitchen, for fish dishes:

**Baked Boiled Flounder Fillets**  
1 cup diced celery  
1 medium onion  
2 fresh tomatoes  
1/2 cup minced green onions  
1/2 cup minced green peppers  
1/2 cup cooking oil  
1/2 cup butter

**Deviled Cod Steaks**  
4 small cod steaks  
1/2 cup mayonnaise  
1/2 cup ketchup  
1/2 cup horseradish  
1/2 cup mustard  
1 tsp. salt

**Fish Loaf**  
2 cups flaked cod  
1 egg, separated  
1/2 cup medium white sauce  
1/2 tsp. salt  
Combine fish, salt, beaten egg yolks, white sauce and beaten egg whites. Pour into greased baking

dish and bake in moderate oven (325°F) 20 to 30 minutes. Serves 4.  
Place vegetables in baking dish and sprinkle with salt, pepper and ketchup. Cut fish into strips about 2 inches wide and 4 inches long. Dip each strip in cracker meal, roll and fasten with toothpicks. Place fish rolls on top of vegetable mixture. Sprinkle with oil or dot with bits of butter. Bake in moderate oven (325°F) for 25 to 40 minutes. Serves 4 or 5.

Wipe cod steaks with damp cloth; spread generously with seasonings mixed together; arrange on greased ovenproof platter; bake in moderate oven (325°F) about 25 minutes. Garnish with parsley if desired. Serves 4.

Vincent Thomas Seeks Re-election As Assemblyman

Assemblyman Vincent Thomas this week announced his candidacy on the Democratic ticket only for re-election to the 68th District. The Thomas Campaign Committee states it is proud of Assemblyman Thomas' record in State legislative measures proposed and sponsored by him during the past session, pointing out some of the qualifications of the present Assemblyman: Educational background: Upon graduation from grammar and high school in San Pedro he attended Santa Clara college where he studied law, completing his last two years at Loyola in 1936.

His legislative record shows his obtaining an appropriation of \$15,000 for the construction of an armory in San Pedro, plans of which are now near completion. It was through Assemblyman Thomas' legislative program that the Municipal Court in San Pedro secured a judge for at least a one year period.

**Active in Legislation**  
The governor had signed approximately 15 measures, introduced by Thomas during last year's session. He was co-author of Assembly Bill 1327, making appropriation of \$500,000.00 for the development and maintenance of ocean and beaches, which was an offer to cities on a matching proposition. During 1941, Assemblyman Thomas was on the following committees: Commerce and Navigation; District Legislation; Manufactures; River Navigation, Reclamation and Flood Control.

Chief Stroth said he had not received a single report that the two-minute audition of the alert signals could not be heard.

Firemen, Messengers, Red Cross First Aid workers, Moose lodge drill teams, P.T.A. units, a section reserved for the mothers and wives of men in the armed forces, city officials of participating communities, ex-service organizations and auxiliaries and others.

A contingent of State Guardsmen will march but in view of recent alert orders it is doubtful if a full regiment will be represented. The commandant at Fort MacArthur has been invited as a special guest.

The parade program at the reviewing stand will follow the dispersing of the parade. This is expected to start at about 8:45 p. m., with Raymond J. Casey as master of ceremonies. Both local bands will play the national anthem to start the program and present numbers during its course.

Distinguished guests are to be introduced and the main address, "A Tribute to General MacArthur" will be given by Chaplain David J. Ferguson of Fort MacArthur who served under the hero of Bataan in World War I.

All present will give the pledge of allegiance and the flag will be lowered with full military ceremony.

At 8 o'clock free motion pictures will be screened at Torrance high school assembly hall, depicting defense activities of boys and girls at Mooseheart, famed home for children operated by the Loyal Order of Moose.

**BLUE, SILVER OR GOLD**  
The Blue Star indicates service in the Army, Navy or Marine Corps within the boundaries of the United States.

The Silver Star denotes service outside the continental United States, either on the high seas in the United States possessions, or on foreign soil.

The Gold Star is America's tribute to those who make the supreme sacrifice under the Stars and Stripes in time of war.

You are entitled to display the proper star for each member of your family serving in the Armed Forces of the United States of America. For example, if you are the parent of one boy in camp in the U.S.A., you are entitled to one Blue Star. If you have two sons in service—one in the U.S.A. and one outside the U.S.A.—you are entitled to a Service Star card bearing one Blue Star and one Silver Star.
