Guard to Make Local Survey

A decision by Major General Walter C. Sweeney, commander of the state's military forces, to conduct a survey of Torrance defense needs and placement of State Guard patrols at strategic points in this locality made a trip to Sacramento by Judge John A. Shidler unnecessary this week. Judge Shidler was instructed by the city council June 9 to go to the state capital to plead for disposition of State Guardsmen at vital defense sites here. General Sweeney, in response to many letters and telegrams from local officials, notified William H. Stanger, superintendent of the Municipal Water District, that he would make no decision on stationing of Guards until after an extensive survey of the community's needs is made.

ment's request for 50,000 kilowatts of energy. In September the amount was increased to 85,000 and later to 170,000 kilowatts. Meanwhile, the projected plant capacity was increased from 50,000,000 pounds to 150,000,000 pounds a year.
When the local Alcoa plant is expanded to include the ton "pop-lines," production capacity will be 300,000,000 pounds a year.
Extensive water storage at Boulder Dam, assuring quantities of secondary power, and the reduction of power-plant capacity normally held in reserve for reliability of service make it certain that the aluminum requirements will be met.
The contract which was signed recently provides for a wholesale rate of approximately 3.75 mills per kilowatt-hour which, it was stated, is sufficient to cover power bureau costs and to show in addition a substantial net return.
