

Central Church to Open New Building and Mark Anniversary

Rushing its reconstruction to completion, Central Evangelical Community church will be ready for a re-opening and rededication service next Sunday afternoon, June 28, at 3 o'clock. In addition to the dedicatory program the church will observe its silver anniversary. Central church was organized here May 3, 1917, by Rev. J. P. Ash. The church is located at the corner of Marcelina and Arlington aves.

Because the edifice suffered severe damage in the earthquake Nov. 14, it has been completely remodeled inside and out. As a result the Church begins its 26th year of service with a thoroughly modernized plant. The interior seating arrangement has been enlarged and altered and entirely new pulpit furniture has been procured affording Central church one of the city's most beautiful sanctuaries.

Public Cordially Invited

Sunday will be a homecoming day for all members, former members and friends. At 11 o'clock, Rev. O. D. Womder, former pastor, will speak. Miss Florence Nelson of Los Angeles will be guest soloist.

The rededication program will begin Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock. There will be no long speeches during the hour. Several former pastors will be present and fraternal delegates will represent local and statewide churches. The choir of the Santa Ana Evangelical church will sing.

At 4 p. m., Elvin Bjornstad, noted dramatic and lyric tenor of Oslo, Norway, will present an hour's sacred concert. He has sung throughout Europe and the United States. Many critics have compared his voice with that of the late Caruso. The public is invited to enjoy this concert hour.
