According to the report. Data contained in the survey was obtained from the State Railroad Commission, the U. S. Employment Agency and local industrial plants.

Sufficient copies of the survey are being prepared to supply each important war-time industrial plant in the Torrance area and as soon as they are completed members of the local housing committee plan to present them to factory executives with the urgent request that they use their influence in obtaining an allocation of Federal funds.

Location of any housing project that may be obtained would determine under which authority it would be built, it was revealed. If a location is selected in the Los Angeles shoeing strip, the L. A. City Authority would have charge, whereas, if a location within the city of Torrance or county territory is chosen, the County Housing Authority would be the logical agency to undertake the work.


