

Evolution of Our Flag



Beginning Monday night, July 27, at 7 o'clock, Leonard Babcock will conduct a Red Cross first aid class in the city hall council chamber. Advanced class will start Tuesday night, Aug. 4, at 7 o'clock in the city hall courtroom with Fred Folts as instructor.

An efficient practice drill was held by the Volunteer First Aid Detachment in the Civic Auditorium last Thursday night. Motor Corps members assisted in the rehearsal and, according to Caspar Clemmer, adjutant, the Detachment is now "beginning to show the results of its faithful practice sessions in increased speed and ease of handling injured victims."

The next practice will be held Thursday night, July 30, at 7 o'clock in the Auditorium. Every V.E.A.D. member should be present. Those who cannot attend the drills should turn in their armbands so that the insignia may be given to others who can take the training regularly, Clemmer said.

Election Printing Costs \$108,505

Printing work on the August and November election ballots will cost a total of \$108,505, according to the low bids obtained by J. M. Hughes, acting county purchasing agent.

Sample ballots are printed on white low-cost paper, but the official ballots at each election must be printed on special state water-marked paper, which for the August primary alone will cost \$13,948 and must be added to the cost of printing. Paper for the November election has not yet been purchased by the county.

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Special Congressional Election Ruled Out by Court Mandate

of the Democratic County Central Committee and a small organized labor faction with total disregard of the rank and file of labor and members of the Democratic party.

Primary Candidates Listed
"Then Olson called the special election to induct his trusted cohort into office, using the special election method to avoid jeopardizing chances of defeat at the hands of the voters of the 46th Assembly District, thus placing him (King) in office for the four-month term ending Dec. 31 and placing him on the Nov. 3 ballot as the incumbent, an equivalent to election," Stewart declared.

Only three candidates qualified (by securing more than 6,000 endorsements required by law) for the special election. They were Judge John A. Shidler of Torrance, who assailed the governor's move when it was first announced and continued to brand it as "the lowest kind of politics;" John T. Rawls of San Pedro, who also opposed the Olson-King machinations, and King.

Candidates who have filed for the regular August 25 Primaries are:
DEMOCRATS: Judge John A. Shidler, C. Ed Jones and John Rawls, both of San Pedro; George H. Moore of Wilmington; Harry A. Gallbraith and George Kramer, both of Los Angeles.
REPUBLICAN and DEMOCRAT: ("cross-filers") Wilder W. Hartley, San Pedro; Victor D. McCarthy, El Segundo; Leonard J. Rouse, Harold A. Sparling and Cecil King, all of Los Angeles, and Ernest E. Stewart of Manhattan Beach.

District Anti-Olson
In commenting on the outcome of his successful effort to block the governor's plan to push King into Congress, Stewart declared yesterday: "This act of Olson's is only one of many of the Olson machine, all carried out with the intention of seating its own candidate by methods fair or foul, savoring of fraud and conspiracy to defeat the legally constituted primary election law method of selecting candidates by the vote of the people."

"The feeling in the entire 17th Congressional District runs high against Olson and if the consensus in that district is a fair indication of the state-wide feeling, Olson will lose his own race in the primary and carry along with him to defeat his entire personally selected slate of 'endorsed' candidates."

Los Angeles county now has seven representatives in Washington instead of eight but Jan. 1, 1943 will see 10 Los Angeles county Congressmen at the capital because of the addition of two new Congressional Districts. One, the 21st, also embraces part of San Bernardino county.
