Pastors Object To Any Defense Meets Sundays

Disapproval of the holding of defense schools, demonstrations or councils on Sunday mornings was expressed by a resolution adopted recently by the Torrance Ministerial Union. The ministers were informed by Police Chief John Stroth, director of Civilian Defense, that no such groups had convened Sunday mornings for several months, that the only unit that sometimes meets on the Sabbath were Auxiliary Firemen who cannot attend instruction to safeguard the entire community at any other time because of their work.

The pastors, while noting the "marked decrease in the calling of such meetings, hoped that the spirit of their resolution shall become a fixed policy in the community." The text of the resolution follows: "Believing, that the church is the most important part of all agencies essential to the building and the strengthening of national morale, by the undergirding of the moral and the spiritual life of the community and the nation, the Ministerial Union of Torrance declares its disapproval of the holding of defense schools, demonstrations or councils on Sunday mornings during established worship hours, except in cases of special emergency. It further declares that authorities and leaders responsible for these groups be encouraged and supported in their efforts to seek a correction of this condition by the establishment of such a rule and policy."

Ministers who endorsed the resolution were the Revs. Harry Branton, Methodist, president of the Ministerial Union; C. Miles Northrup, Baptist; H. Wesley Roloff, Central Evangelical; Paul M. Wheeler, St. Andrew's Episcopal; Paul Perry, Assembly of God, and Ben D. Griffith, Foursquare Gospel.

Candidate King Endorsed by Mrs. Colden

Added to the list of Cecil R. King for Congress endorsements was that of Mrs. Clara Colden, widow of former Congressman Charles J. Colden and herself runner-up in the last two campaigns for representative from the 17th District.

"I entered the last two campaigns because I could not subscribe to the aims and viewpoints of the other candidates," Mrs. Colden stated yesterday. "In Mr. King, however, the 17th District has a candidate to whom I can give conscientious and wholehearted support."

"I have known Mr. King for a number of years, and have followed his career in the State Assembly with a good deal of interest. I feel that his long legislative experience at Sacramento will be of great value to the 17th District and I know that my late husband, who thought as highly as I do of Mr. King's capabilities, would share that opinion."

Also strongly endorsing King was Mrs. Pearl F. Sloan, who started the fight to keep 140,000 voters in the old 17th Congressional District from being disenfranchised by Superior Judge Emmet L. Wilson's writ which attempted to stop the special election Aug. 25 to elect a successor to the late Congressman Lee Geyer, an attempt which was overruled by the State Supreme Court.

"Mr. King is the sort of man that is badly needed in Congress today," said Mrs. Sloan, lifelong friend of the candidate. "He has the unqualified recommendation of both organized and unorganized labor, of veterans' organizations, of civic groups in this community. He is a man who will make a record in Congress that the 17th District will be proud to watch."

Under the California Election Code all California registered voters have the right to vote absentee by mail if they are to be absent from their home precincts on election day. Absentee ballots are available until Aug. 20 upon application to the county clerk. The ballot can be marked on or before election day but it must be returned to the county clerk from whom it was secured before Aug. 31. Before the marked ballot is returned to the county clerk it must be sworn to before a county clerk, a deputy county clerk, or a notary public. However, no charge may be made for this service if it is performed in California.

The application must be made and signed by the registered voter himself and cannot be made for him by anyone else.

In making application for an absentee ballot certain information must be supplied to the county clerk to whom the application is made. County clerks will supply application forms upon request, but a letter from the applicant setting forth the fact that he will be absent from his election precinct on election day, stating the election at which he wishes to vote, giving his present mailing address and also setting forth his registered address, will be adequate. The applicant's signature should be the same as that on his affidavit of registration. We suggest the use of the application form printed below. This form, properly filled out, supplies all the necessary information.
