

# Joe Smith Dies At Family Home

Seriously ill for the past week, Joe Smith, 71, died at his home, 2011 240th st., Lomita, early yesterday morning of a heart attack and complications. A native of Virginia who came to California 16 years ago from Indiana, Mr. Smith worked at the National Supply plant in Torrance for 14 years. He retired in February, 1941 as a watchman.

He leaves a wife, Sallie; two sons, Bernard B., of Crawfordsville, Ind., and Arthur P., of Santa Ana; two daughters, Mrs. A. E. Horney and Mrs. Delbert Boyland of Lomita, and 13 grandchildren.

Mr. Smith was a member of the Full Gospel church of Gardena. The funeral arrangements are awaiting word from his son in Indiana. The body is at Stone and Myers' mortuary.

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
