War Bond Sales At Booths Here Exceed \$27,000

"People in Torrance have already made a magnificent response to the call of patriotism," says Mrs. Harriet V. Leech, chairman of the women's organizations which are handling the drive for sale of War Bonds and Stamps. "After only six and one-half actual working days in the booths at the Bank of America and the Torrance National Bank, the sum of \$27,125 has been realized, and the demand continues at a gratifying rate."

Mrs. Leech reports that a mass meeting of the women's groups and all others not affiliated with organizations who wish to serve, will be called for an early date, probably next week, when further plans will be arranged for the work. Mrs. Leech particularly emphasized that service in the booths is not limited to women in organizations, but she invites any others who will do so to volunteer their services.

Since it requires four or five women daily to take care of the work, it will take a large number of volunteers to carry on without interruption.

"Dollars Are Cheap" Torrance can well be proud of its showing to date, and the general chairman, J. Hugh Sherfey, and his assistant chairman, Carlotta Reese and George Marlow, join with Mrs. Leech in expressing their gratitude for the splendid way the people have responded to the call for funds.

"You can be sure that Torrance people are definitely remembering Pearl Harbor, Bataan and the sacrifice of our own young men who died at their posts of duty in Hawaii and elsewhere," said Sherfey.

"Dollars are cheap, compared to the tribute these boys paid to their country, but we who stay at home can at least aid with our means to protect and aid those who go to the battle lines."
