'Dick' Carver, Herald 'Alumnus,' Now Training In Maritime Service

Another Torrance Herald "alumnus" to join the nation's service—and the 26th to do so from this newspaper's family—is Richard Carver, who was advertising manager for more than a year. He is now at the U. S. Maritime Training Station at Sheepshead Bay, Brooklyn, N. Y. Carver's immediate predecessor as Herald advertising manager, Ray Brooks, was inducted into the Army last week, it was learned here Tuesday. Brooks was employed at the Lockheed Aircraft plant in Burbank at the time of his induction.

"Dick" Carver tried to enlist in the armed services and writes: "I got into this on the bounce and within a week of signing on I was en route to New York. Had a good trip and this is a good station. It is only two months old, has 5,000 men here now and will have 10,000 aboard by Dec. 31. It's an all new plant, located on the edge of Brooklyn, the former location of a tacky resort like Venice.

Protest Filed on Proposed Pinball Licensing Fee

A protest on behalf of the retail alcoholic beverage dealers from Roy S. Adams of the Southern California Tavern Owners Association against Councilman Nick Cucchi's proposed pinball machine license ordinance was read to the city council Tuesday night. Adams said his association was not objecting to a licensing ordinance governing the machines but believed Cucchi's plan to collect \$180 per year per machine was "most unjust and excessive." Cucchi was not present at the council meeting and no further public action has been taken on his proposal since he had City Attorney John E. McCaff instructed Oct. 13 to draft such an amendment to the city license ordinance. Adams wrote that he would like to be informed when there is to be a public hearing or discussion of the measure in order that he could be present. His letter was filed for future reference.

Civil Service Board Raps Council Knuckles

Members of the Torrance City Service board rapped the knuckles of the city council in a letter read Tuesday night which advised the municipal managers to leave all personnel changes in the future in the hands of the board. The reprimand followed the council's action of Oct. 27 in transferring Albert Treloar from the bus department to the city garage. The Civil Service group informed the council that the transfer was improperly made. The council took the reprimand good naturedly, rescinding its action and requested the board to reclassify Treloar according to its rules.

GYPSIES' LAST ENCAMPMENT

Only a Gypsy—or a true American hobo—could experience to the full the nostalgic sadness which overshadowed an encampment of 300 Gypsies at Belleville, Illinois. Outwardly the meeting was gay and happy; for the nomads had traveled great distances, in their battered old automobiles and trailers, to attend that joy of a Gypsy's heart—the celebration of a child marriage. The groom, aged 9, and the bride, 11, were from Virginia and Wisconsin, respectively—virtual next-door neighbors, as Gypsies regard distance. Pigs, turkeys, chickens and lambs were cooked on spits. The black-eyed women were dressed in festival finery, in jewels and flashing colors. The principals played with the other children until time for the ceremony, which took 20 minutes. They will live, in Gypsy custom, as brother and sister, in the groom's father's home until old enough for the civil marriage. At last the oldest man arose and said slowly: "This will be the last encampment for us while the war lasts. Gas and the rationing are putting an end to our roving days. Many of us already are fighting and working in war industries. No one place is our home; but the roads we have wandered on are America's roads; all America is our home and fatherland. We must fight for America. That is our desire and our duty." The hobo of yesteryear, listening in the night to the far deep voice of a locomotive, realizing that he must resist its call and respond in the morning, and every morning, to the war plant's whistle, would understand the quaver in the old Gypsy's voice. An O. Henry would do much with the theme of America's nomads in war-time.
