U. S. Steel Expanding at Fast Pace In All-Out War Effort, Olds Says
"United States Steel Corporation is engaged in the greatest plant expansion project in its history, costing more than \$700,000,000—about two thirds of which is for account of the United States Government," Irving S. Olds, chairman of the board of directors of United States Steel Corp., said this week in a statement reviewing accomplishments of the corporation and subsidiary companies during the first year of war.
New steel producing or finishing units near Pittsburgh, Chicago, Cleveland, Birmingham, Duluth, Worcester, Mass., Provo, Utah, and on the west coast are being pushed to completion night and day by thousands of workers. Most of these units will go into production during the first half of 1943. A major part of the new facilities is being erected by U. S. Steel for the account and at the expense of the government. For the remainder, the corporation is using its own funds.
The vast steel expansion now being carried on by U. S. Steel and other steel companies in accordance with the wishes of the Federal government," Olds said, "should insure, upon its completion, the supply of steel required for a war on various fronts."
"There must be no relaxation of American industry's all-out war production effort," Olds added. "The record of U. S. Steel's contribution to the war effort since Pearl Harbor has been most creditable, but we must not be content with past accomplishments. In the days ahead, we must work even harder to attain the steel production needed to win the war."
Reviewing the corporation's production figures, Olds stated that more than 1,000 new production records have been established since Pearl Harbor by U. S. Steel subsidiaries. As instances of outstanding performance, the U. S. Steel chairman cited the delivery of 24 destroyers, two cruisers, and many merchant ships, tankers, and auxiliary vessels; the invention and production of portable steel runways for airplanes; an accelerated method of spinning bomb casings; completion in four months of 550 miles of pipe for the war emergency oil pipe line; and the production in one week by a single subsidiary of a quantity of steel plates in excess of

Gardena Bus to Serve Refinery
Bus service for General Petroleum refinery employees to and from the plant in Torrance and the terminals of street car lines at 116th st., will be furnished by the Gardena Municipal bus system on regular schedule. Ward, manager of the Torrance Municipal bus lines, said he had no objection to the entry of the Gardena service in this territory because the service was not competitive.

New Mansion For Governor Is Proposed
Chester F. Gannon, Sacramento county's new eighth district assemblyman, says he will introduce a bill at the next session of the legislature proposing purchase of a site and construction of a new executive mansion for the governor of California.
The bill will contain an appropriation of \$150,000 and will recommend selection of a site opposite Capitol park, he said. Gannon characterized the present executive mansion, purchased more than 60 years ago, as a "veritable fire trap."

Beef Rolls in Tomato Sauce
Broadcast by: Mary Lee Taylor, Dec. 10

1/2 cup finely cut onion
1 1/2 lbs. cube or round steak
1 1/2 tablespoons melted butter or other shortening
2 tablespoons flour
3 tablespoons hot shortening
1/2 cup Pet Milk diluted with 1/2 cup water
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup corn meal

1 1/2 lbs. cube or round steak
1/2-inch thick
2 tablespoons flour
3 tablespoons hot shortening
10 per cent condensed tomato soup
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup Pet Milk

Cook onion slowly for 5 minutes in melted butter. Add diluted milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Stir in corn meal. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Stir and boil slowly for 5 minutes, or until mixture thickens. Remove from heat. Cover and let stand until needed. Cut steak into 6 pieces about 3 x 6 inches. Mix together flour, remaining 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 cup water and 1/2 cup Pet Milk. Pound flour mixture into one side of meat, turn floured side down. Put equal portions of stuffing on unfloured side of meat. Roll up, secure with string on toothpicks. Brown on all sides in hot shortening. Add mixture of soup and water. Cover and cook slowly for 1 hour, or until meat is tender, turning occasionally. Remove meat to platter. Stir sauce remaining in pan into hot milk. Do not heat after combining the two mixtures. Serve at once with the meat. Serves 6.

Fire Marshal Would Prevent Fire Holocaust
State Fire Marshal Lydell Peck has issued a special bulletin to the California Fire Service urging that all night clubs, restaurants and similar places of amusement be inspected at once to prevent other fires like the one at the Boston Coconut Grove which snuffed out 480 lives.
Peck said, "It should be made impossible for such a holocaust to occur elsewhere in this enlightened age. The use of inflammable decorations invites disaster. Necessary hangings and drapes should be flameproofed and the flameproofing process renewed at necessary intervals. The Coconut Grove fire was worse than the Iroquois Theatre fire in Chicago because the modern exception of fire safety is far different than in 1903. The need for adequate exits and elimination of combustible material is paramount. Several of our larger cities have ordinances requiring flameproofing of drapes and decorations in public places. This should be made a state law."

New Liquor Regulations In Effect
Like everything else, the liquor industry is getting around to making wartime sacrifices.
After today it will be illegal to buy a drink after midnight or buy package liquors after 7 p. m. And the opening hours have been pushed up from 6 a. m. to 10 a. m.
