**Church Dinners  
Clearing Debt**

Central Evangelical church held its fifth monthly Church Fellowship Night last Wednesday. After a potluck dinner, Thomas Dougherty entertained more than 60 guests with chalk cartooning. The last scene which he sketched was a beautiful head of Christ. The lights were then turned low while the group sang Christmas carols.

W. E. Bowen, church treasurer, reported more than \$650 had been raised through the first five of the monthly dinners. Nickel and dime banks, which are brought in at each of the dinners, were means used in raising this money, which is applied to the building indebtedness.

The church is reported by its pastor, Rev. H. Wesley Roloff, striving to raise a total of \$2,000 on its earthquake indebtedness by June. If this amount is raised the Church Conference will match it with an equal sum. That would clear the entire church debt in a little more than a year.

**Father Bauer Asks Rededication  
To Spiritual Living as Yule Gift**

Pleading for a "re-dedication of ourselves to the true Christ-like living" as "our Christmas gift to our Saviour and to the war-torn world in which we live," Rev. Father Joseph L. Bauer, pastor of the Catholic Church of the Nativity, has addressed the following Christmas message to his parishioners and the community at large:

"The message to the world on the day of Our Lord's birth and again on the day of His resurrection from the dead was a message of peace. Peace on earth to men of good will.

"Practically the entire world is at war, because it has forgotten its Infant Saviour of Bethlehem and thrown off His yoke, which is sweet, and His burden which is light. The world, so lacking in 'men of good will' is unworthy of the peace which the Saviour came to bring. Its sinfulness has provoked the wrath of God.

"But there can be peace in our hearts and souls on Christmas Day, provided we re-dedicate ourselves to true Christ-like living. This means that Christ must have the first place in our lives, that we must be careful to avoid all willful sin, that we must pray earnestly and practice daily some form of mortification.

"True Christlike living will bring peace to our own souls and make the world less unworthy of the peace of Our Saviour. Let this re-dedication of ourselves to true Christlike living be our Christmas gift to our Saviour and to the war-torn world in which we live.

"On this festive occasion I invoke the blessings of Heaven upon you. I wish you a very holy Christmas, a blessed Christmas filled with many favors and graces from the hands of the Infant Jesus. May you share in the abundance of joy bestowed upon the world by the Babe of Bethlehem. A holy Christmas! A holy New Year!"

**Medical Group  
Announced by  
Dr. W. I. Laughon**

Formation of the Torrance Medical Group, an association of three physicians and surgeons and a registered nurse as a qualified X-ray and laboratory technician, was formally announced yesterday by Dr. W. I. Laughon. The new organization will succeed the firm formerly known as Drs. Harrison and Laughon and, until completion of an expansion program, will continue to maintain offices at 1339 Post ave.

Associated with Dr. Laughon will be Drs. Paul K. Edmunds and Herbert A. Carlson, while Mary D. Fuson, R.N., M.T., R.T., is the X-ray and laboratory technician.

Dr. Carlson came to Torrance direct from Minot, North Dakota, where he served as surgeon in the Northwest Clinic from 1939 until he brought his family, consisting of Mrs. Carlson and their four-year-old daughter, Eleanor, to California. A graduate of the University of Minnesota's medical school in 1924, Dr. Carlson did post-graduate work in surgery at that institution from 1929 to 1933.

During that time he served one year as a research fellow in surgery at Barnes hospital on the campus of Washington University in St. Louis, Mo., where he majored in chest surgery under direction of Dr. Ewart-Graham of St. Louis, famed thoracic surgeon.

Dr. Carlson returned to the University of Minnesota in 1933 to become an instructor and was shortly appointed assistant professor in surgery. He also served as surgeon at the Minnesota State Sanatorium. He is a fellow in the American College of Surgeons and also an active member of the Association for Thoracic Surgery.

**These Recipes Help  
'Share the Meat'**

One of the world's most famous gourmets is helping the meal planners of the country to cooperate in the government's voluntary "Share the Meat" plan. He is no less a personage than Oscar, host of the well-known Waldorf Astoria in New York, and as a contribution to the campaign he is telling the public some of his secrets for making tasty and different dishes from liver and kidneys, neither of which is on the list of restricted meats.

Here is his suggestion for giving calves liver a real Spanish flavor!

**Calves Liver Espanol**  
Cut the calves liver into slices weighing about 3½ ounces (just under a quarter pound). Season with salt and pepper. Dredge with flour; then sprinkle with olive oil and grill gently. (If olive oil is not available, use any good salad oil.) Meantime prepare as many grilled half-tomatoes as there are pieces of liver. Also cut onions into thin round slices, season, dredge with flour and fry in oil. Arrange the slices of liver along the center of a platter; place a grilled half tomato on each and decorate with the fried onions.

Since every adult civilian is being asked not to eat more than 2½ pounds weekly of the usual cuts of beef, lamb, mutton, veal and pork, more and more of those unrestricted meats which the butchers call the "variety" meats are going to find their way into menus.

**Hungarian Sauteed Kidneys**  
Remove the outer skin from mutton or lamb kidneys. Cut
