**Christian Science War Relief Work Activities Told**

The Christian Science War Relief Committee of The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass., which was established in September 1940, has recently released its second annual report. This shows that it now has more than 1500 branch units active in the United States besides many more in Great Britain, Canada, Australia and the Union of South Africa.

The committee has assembled since Pearl Harbor over 66,000 pounds of durable clothing and bedding, in waterproof, moth proof, wooden cases, at convenient locations on the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, ready for instant use should emergencies arise because of local enemy action.

More than 32,800 garments have been distributed to men in the United States forces. Civilians arriving in the United States suffering because of war conditions or action have been provided with clothing and other forms of relief. Among them are refugees from the Far East, who landed in California; and merchant seamen rescued from ships torpedoed along the Atlantic coast have been similarly cared for. This work is carried on by the committee without regard to creed or race.

First Church of Christ Scientist of Torrance organized a war relief committee last April. More than 700 garments which included pieced wool quilts, lap robes, army sweaters and all kinds of wearing apparel have been sent to the Christian Science War Relief headquarters from this local organization.

**Van Nuys Doctor With Torrance Medical Group**

A physician and surgeon of 12 years' intensive practice, Dr. Paul K. Edmunds, is a member of the recently formed Torrance Medical Group whose other members are Drs. W. L. Laughon and Herbert A. Carlson and Mary D. Fuson, R. N., X-ray and laboratory technician. The offices are at 1339 Post ave.

Dr. Edmunds, a native of Utah, received his B. A. degree at the University of Utah, and his M. B. and M. D. degrees at Northwestern University in 1929 and 1930 respectively. He was one of the top students of his class and was elected to membership in Alpha Omega Alpha, national medical fraternity. He took his interne training at Cook County hospital in Chicago, the largest institution of its kind in the nation, for 21 months and held a surgical residency at Golden State hospital in Los Angeles for three years.

Later he became associated with J. R. French and staff, prominent Los Angeles industrial medical group, where he practiced until 1936. He entered private practice at Corcoran in Kings county where he was elected president of the County Medical Society and was a delegate to the California Medical Association conventions from 1937 to 1940. He remained in Corcoran until 1941 when he and his family moved to Van Nuys where he had an extensive practice prior to joining the Torrance Medical Group.

He took post-graduate work at Cook County Post-Graduate School of Medicine in Chicago in 1939.

**Advice on Food Poisoning Given**

**SAN FRANCISCO**—Food poisoning may be classified technically as an intoxication, according to Dr. K. F. Meyer, Director of the Hooper Foundation for Medical Research at the University of California, and Dr. J. C. Geiger, Director of the San Francisco Department of Health.

Referring to poisoning by bacterial toxin rather than alcohol, they described various types of food intoxication in contributing to the recently revised circular on "Home Canning" issued by the University of California College of Agriculture.

The most virulent form of food poisoning is the so-called botulinus intoxication. It was reported, but experience has taught that in the United States outbreaks due to bacteria other than botulinus are fairly common.

The new type of food poisoning due to the toxic products of staphylococcus is much more frequently encountered than has formerly been believed," declared the doctors, indicating that the mortality rate in this type of illness is less than one per cent, as compared with over 60 per cent in botulinus.

"Never taste spoiled canned food," they warned, pointing out that food poisoning has resulted from this. "Suspicious jars or cans of food should be destroyed and not fed to animals. Many cases are on record in which large numbers of chickens have been killed by this procedure."

**Home for Court Wards Investigated, Found Satisfactory**

Acting on orders given by the city council Dec. 22 when Earl E. Palmer of 4813 West 171st st., protested against continuance of what he reported was a "boarding home for reform school children," Police Chief John Stroh inspected the premises on West 171st st., a few days later. He found that the home is

rented by a Mexican couple who have five boys who are wards of the Juvenile Court. In his report to the council, Chief Stroh noted that the place is clean and orderly and while the accommodations are somewhat limited, he found nothing objectionable to the establishment.

Palmer urged the council to "look up a loophole in the law to get those people out of there," contending that "the odor of dairies is far better than having reform school kids in your neighborhood."
