
OBITUARY

OPA Alters Rule On Coffee Ration For 15-Year-Olds

The OPA had to change its method of rationing coffee to youngsters who have just turned 15. The commonsense rule, which it had adopted, of permitting those who have become 15 since war ration book No. 1 was issued last May, to get coffee by a simple age affidavit was set aside in a ruling from Washington. The Washington order held that only those whose age is shown as 15 at the time they received Book No. 1 may buy coffee. The ruling creates inequality, it was pointed out, denying coffee to some who are 15 and allowing it to others on the mere circumstances of their having been actually 15 when their books were issued.

Puppy at Trailer Camp Endangers 27 Persons' Lives

Twenty-seven persons, most of them defense workers in the San Pedro-Lomita area, are now undergoing Pasteur treatment as the result of having been bitten or scratched by a "playful little puppy" which died of rabies, according to C. O. Harvey, County Health Department chief quarantine officer. Not one of the 27 cases was reported to the Health Department, nor was a single bite cauterized, despite the fact that some of them were on the face. The quarantine officer said that all dogs in the two trailer camps where the puppy had been with its owner, L. K. Anderson, have been quarantined. Owners of some of the dogs known to have fought with the rabid dog are giving their pets anti-rabic treatment. The puppy, a tiny, six months old cross between a Dachshund and Pekingese, was taken from La Bamba Trailer Camp in San Pedro by its owner to Orchard Trailer Park, 25344 Pennsylvania ave., Lomita, three weeks ago. On Dec. 30, after the animal had become noticeably cross, with a tendency to bite everyone it came in contact, it was taken to a veterinarian in Long Beach where it died. Long Beach City Health Department laboratory tests proved positive for rabies. Mr. and Mrs. Holder, operators of the Orchard Trailer Park Camp, cooperated with health authorities in rounding up human contacts. Harvey reports that animal rabies in 1942 totaled 309 cases, more than for any other year, since the big epidemic of 1938. All dog owners in the Long Beach-Lomita area are warned by the Health Department to watch their pets closely for signs of rabies, since they may have wandered into the camps and have been bitten by the rabid puppy.

Torrance Bomber Pilot Praised for Making Fine Crash-Landing

Lieut. Carroll J. Bender, son of Mrs. William N. Hiatt of 21502 Berendo ave., was commended by Major William D. Ready of the Pocatello Army Air Base for a "fine job of crash landing" a four-motored Army bomber after the huge craft's landing gear jammed during a takeoff Dec. 26. Major Ready said Lieut. Bender was at the controls of the bomber and as the plane gained flying speed a contractor's truck, driven by a civilian, drove across the takeoff strip. A propeller of the plane slashed into the truck cab but the driver escaped injury. One of the plane's wheels struck the truck, damaging the landing gear. Bender kept the plane in flight. He was ordered to fly over the Pocatello base several hours to lighten the fuel load, then was told to fly to Hill Field, near Ogden, Utah, to attempt a landing. He set the plane down there, Major Ready said, causing only minor damage to the craft.

Motorists Slow In Paying Fees At Local Office

Issuance of receipts for 1943 motor vehicle license tabs started slowly in Torrance Jan. 2 at the State Motor Vehicle department's branch office in the Torrance hotel building at 1879 Carson st., according to Manager Harry L. Rose. The office is open daily except Sunday from 9 a. m. to 12 o'clock noon and from 1 to 5 p. m. First motorist to apply for a receipt (the license tabs will be sent later to those paying their fees) was E. A. Reiss of 1725 West 253rd st., Lomita, who received receipt number 2910001 on his "white" slip for his Chevrolet sedan. The next for in line was Alfred L. Wheaton, 2375 West 247th st., Lomita; N. P. Marin, 1673 252nd st., Harbor City; William H. Ambach, 1813 Border ave., Torrance, and Rose A. McFarland, 1013 Gardena Blvd., Gardena. Manager Rose is assisted by Mrs. Ida Mae Thompson of 1726 Watson st., as cashier and Mrs. Cleora Stanger of 1605 Cota ave., as rate clerk. Last year the Torrance branch office issued a total of 13,087 sets of license plates and grossed \$106,764.40 for a record amount of fees. In making application for license renewal, motorists should designate the types of gasoline rationing books—A, B, C or T—in their possession in the lower right hand corner of the white certificate. Renewal applications may be mailed or delivered in person to the Torrance branch office until Feb. 4.

Torrance Third In Bond Parade

Torrance placed third in its class in the "Parade of Bonds" which replaced the Tournament of Roses parade in Pasadena New Year's Day. This city was in a group of cities with War Bond quotas ranging from \$50,000 to \$75,000. Total sales were not announced for the individual winners but it is known here that this community exceeded its quota. The city of South Pasadena won first place in this class with Orange second. The "Parade of Bonds" brought in a total of \$65,887,887, the parade committee announced, adding that trophies would be awarded for various divisions. Formal notification of the winners was made between the halves of the Georgia-U. C. L. A. football game. Honolulu was awarded the sweepstakes prize for exceeding its quota of \$4,350,000. Grand prize went to Houston, Tex., for exceeding its quota of \$3,812,400. Glendale drew the theme prize for exceeding a quota of \$451,400. More than 2,200,000 extra pairs of pajamas can be made from material saved by the simplification program for men's and boys' pajamas.
