One copy of this Declaration must be filed with the Office of Price Administration by each person applying for War Ration Book Two for the members of a family unit, and by each person who is not a member of a family unit. File at the site designated. Coupons will be deducted for excess supplies of the foods listed below according to the schedules announced by the Office of Price Administration.

CONSUMER DECLARATION

Processed Foods and Coffee

I HEREBY CERTIFY that I am authorized to apply for and receive a War Ration Book Two for each person listed below who is a member of my family unit, or the other person or persons for whom I am acting whose War Ration Book One I have submitted to the Board.

That the name of each person and number of his or her War Ration Book One are accurately listed below;

That none of these persons is confined or resident in an institution, or is a member of the armed forces receiving subsistence in kind or eating in separate messes under an officer's command;

That no other application for War Ration Book Two for these persons has been made;

That the following inventory statements are true and include all indicated foods owned by all persons included in this Declaration:

COFFEE

1. Pounds of coffee owned on Nov. 28, 1942, minus 1 pound for each person included in this Declaration whose age as stated on War Ration Book One is 14 years or older.

CANNED FOODS

Include all commercially canned fruits (including spiced), canned vegetables; canned fruit and vegetable juices; canned soups, chili sauce and catsup.

Do not include canned olives; canned meat and fish; pickles, relish; jellies, jams and preserves; spaghetti, macaroni and noodles; or home-canned foods.

3. Number of cans, bottles and jars (8-ounce size or larger) of commercially packed fruits, vegetables, juices and soups, chili sauce and catsup owned on Feb. 21, 1943, minus 5 for each person included in this Declaration.

"I am especially thankful to those people, both Catholic and non-Catholic in our community who have given so much assistance and moral support during my two years and four months in Torrance," he said.

"Many costly and necessary gifts in the form of gold-plated goods, statuary, marble holy water fonts and sacred vestments have been donated within the past year. The complete landscaping of the entire Church property and installation of a fine sprinkling system were also gifts.

"Windows Works of Art "All pews and woodwork throughout the Church were entirely refinished. Ten small decorative stained glass windows were installed, followed shortly after by seven major windows. These beautiful examples of modern stained glass art, heavily leaded and composed of glowing colors should be seen by everyone who loves fine art and I cordially invite all residents of the city to call at the Church, preferably in the afternoon when the sun enhances their beauty, to see them in all their loveliness," Rev. Bauer said.

"These large windows and their donors were: 'Baptism of Christ' by the Misses Rose and Katherine Orman, 'Marriage at Cana' by Clara Steck, 'Sermon on the Mount' by Mr. and Mrs. John Emery, 'The Last Supper' by Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Fountain, 'The Agony in the Garden' by the parish in memory of the late Father Fitzgerald, 'The Crucifixion' by Mr. and Mrs. Max N. Folker, and 'The Resurrection' by Mr. and Mrs. George Probert. One more large window remains to be sponsored to complete this major beautification.

"Extends Community Blessing "In addition to the many gifts and donations, I also acknowledge with sincerest thanks the great financial assistance rendered me both by Catholics and non-Catholics in reducing our Church indebtedness from \$16,000 to \$8500 during the past year.

"May God bless all the members of our community and may He give them good health and firm courage to face the trials and problems of today. And may He soon show us that peace for which we are striving and which may last long into the future," Father Bauer concluded.
