## More Can Openers Being Produced

Can openers which Mrs. America will find on the market may be limited in the amount of metal allowed, but at least they shouldn't be scarce. The War Production Board has allowed the production quota for civilian uses to be upped from 35 to 50 per cent of the amount manufactured in the year ending June 30, 1941. But no more than 12 ounces of metal may be used in each can opener.

## Names Release Of Selectees to Await Induction

A slightly changed procedure for the publication of names of men inducted was explained today by State Selective Service headquarters.

The new policy provides that the names will not be furnished newspapers by local draft boards until the men have been accepted at the induction stations. It was explained this not only permits the board to give the branch of service to which the man was assigned but avoids the embarrassment of publicity for a man who is publicized as being inducted in a quota but who might be rejected later for various reasons.

The previous policy has been to permit publication of names when the induction quotas are completed by the board and forwarded to the induction station. No board has authority to refuse a request for the names after the induction station has returned the names of men accepted. In most cases, the inductees are on their seven-day furloughs when the names become available.

Advancement of two Torrance men to the Navy's new preflight school at Del Monte was announced by the Naval Aviation Cadet Selection Board late last week. They were George B. The new assignment means that Cadets Selkirk and Banks have successfully completed their preliminary flight training instruction at a War Training Service center, one of the most important stages in the extensive program conducted by the Navy.

At Del Monte they will receive three months of combined military and physical training as well as additional ground school work. Upon completion of the entire Naval Aviation training program, the cadets will be commissioned as ensigns in the Naval Reserve or second lieutenants in the Marine Corps Reserve. Additional men are now being enlisted as potential Naval Aviators under the ruling permitting application by 17-year-old high school seniors and graduates.

Behind the brief reports that The Herald received from his parents that Gray Ver Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Ver Jones, left by plane last Thursday for Managua, Nicaragua to take up his new duties with a contractor's firm engaged in building a portion of the Pan-American highway there is a story of exceptional grit and determination.

Gray attempted to enlist several times in the armed forces and each time was rejected for physical reasons. But he did not let those rejections get him down. He kept trying to get into some outfit that was making vital contribution to the war effort—and even today his determination is as strong as ever.

The Herald learned that the contracting firm is operating under direction of the U. S. Army Engineers and that Gray thus will have his hopes of working for Uncle Sam realized if his health withstands the Central American climate.

While his headquarters will be at Managua, he will travel through Costa Rica, Nicaragua and the Honduras and will probably spend most of his time in San Jose, Costa Rica. He is communications (radio) engineer for Swinterton, McClure and Vinnell. The Pan-American highway project is under direction of the Army Engineers' department.


