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## Crossing Guard Pay Data Given

After receiving a detailed report from Police Chief John Strohm on the wages paid crossing guards in several other cities, the state and county, the city council Tuesday night decided to consider the request of Mrs. Cecilia Young, crossing guard, for increased pay at the next regular meeting which is set for Tuesday night, April 27. Mrs. Young asked for the increase, citing the rising cost of

living, several weeks ago and Strohm was instructed then to secure the figures on what other districts are paying their guards. The Torrance pay is 60 cents an hour for five hours' work. He reported that Inglewood pays 75 cents an hour for two hours, Hermosa Beach 60 cents for five hours, Los Angeles 70 cents for five hours, California Highway Patrol 80 cents for five hours and the county was paying from 50 to 90 cents an hour when it was employing crossing guard.
