

Poppies Arrive for Street Sale Here May 28-29

"The poppies have arrived!" This was the word that flashed to members of the American Legion Auxiliary here today. Many started the work of arranging the little red flowers for Poppy days, May 28 and 29. The poppies, 2000 of them, were in boxes shipped from Sawtelle where they were made by disabled war veterans under direction of the California Department of the Auxiliary.

Shaped patiently by hand, each little flower is a replica in crepe paper of the flowers

that bloomed on the battlefields of the first World war. "Flanders Fields are on the other side of the world from Guadalcanal and a quarter of a century distant in time but the little wild poppy of Flanders speaks for the dead of both battles," Mrs. Laila Bowen, Poppy sale chairman, said. "The poppy is the memorial flower for all who have died in America's struggle against world slavery, wherever or whenever they fell."

The poppies are being sorted and counted ready to go into the baskets of the Auxiliary volunteers who will distribute them throughout the city May 28 and 29. Contributions received for them will aid the Legion's and Auxiliary's work for disabled veterans and families of service men.

City to Adopt Leash Law Aimed at Dogs

A new city ordinance prohibiting dogs from running at large is scheduled to be adopted by the city council within the next few weeks and go into effect 30 days later. The measure, as proposed by Councilman Nick Cucci, is aimed at animals destroying Victory gardens and is modeled after the county leash law.

Under its terms, dogs must be confined to the owner's yards or kept on a chain or leash "not exceeding six feet in length and held by some responsible person." It provides for the notification of owners whose dogs are impounded within 12 hours after capture and their destruction after six full days of confinement. Violation of the new measure will be a misdemeanor, punishable upon conviction by a fine of not more than \$300, imprisonment for three months or both.

Recruiting for the Torrance-Lomita company started early in September, 1941. At first it was planned as a cavalry outfit. Later it was absorbed by the 4th Regiment as an infantry company. Except for a month late last summer when it was stationed at Hermosa Beach, the company's headquarters has been at the Torrance city park.

Co. H took over patrol of the Torrance water tower July 1, 1942, relieving city-paid guards. Because accommodations at the city park were primitive and unsanitary, Lieuts. Dylmage and Lewellen appealed to the city council July 31, 1942 for improved quarters. At the same time, Mrs. Rosemary De Camp

Shidler was made "honorary captain" of the company. The council agreed with the Guard officers that the park quarters were very poor and work started on several new buildings, including a barracks, kitchen and messhall, within two weeks. The quarters were completed and occupied early in September, 1942.

Among those who gave their services to the company without compensation were Dr. F. H. Racer, physician; Dr. T. W. Bullock, dentist; Miss Lute Fraser and Miss Alice Dunstan, reserve members who made up records, and the late Capt. L. H. Gillies, first company drill master.
