RATION BOOK 3 OUT IN JUNE OPA Will Mail New Replacement

Mail centers have been announced by the Office of Price Administration for the distribution on the Pacific Coast in June of War Ration Book No. 3 which provides new stamps to replace those running out in existing books.

Approximately 12 million copies of the replacement book will be distributed by mail to residents of California, Arizona, Nevada, Oregon and Washington from the following state centers: San Francisco, Phoenix, Reno, Portland and Seattle.

Regional O.P.A. officials emphasized that Book No. 3 is a replacement book and that at the present time no further rationing programs are contemplated. Book 3 combines "unit" stamps—already familiar under the sugar, coffee and shoe programs—and "point" stamps, now used for canned goods, meats and fats.

O.P.A. officials explained that a simple post-card application will be the method of distribution of Book 3 under the plan. Application forms, good for a single person or an entire family, will be dropped in every mail box by postmen between May 20 and June 5. The head of the house will fill out the cards, which are pre-addressed to O.P.A. mail centers, for the entire family and post them between June 1 and June 10. O.P.A. mail centers will begin sending out the books late in June.

New Sulfa Drug Treatment for Impetigo Found

Mothers whose children contact impetigo—and it's a daily risk as any mother can tell you—will hail with a sense of joy the announcement that a one-day, one-treatment cure of the unpleasant, highly contagious and sometimes dangerous skin disease has been achieved by a new white-mud sulfa drug treatment.

Success with the treatment, which also promptly stops the spread of impetigo, is announced by Dr. T. N. Harris of the University of Pennsylvania in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Sulfathiazole is the drug Dr. Harris used, though he suggests other sulfa drugs could also be used with the new method.

Different Method Used
Instead of giving sulfathiazole by mouth or using an ointment or ordinary powder of the drug, as has been done heretofore in impetigo cases he uses a micro-crystalline form of sulfathiazole in a 20 per cent suspension in water.

A drop or two of this suspension, which looks like milk of magnesia, is put on a gauze dressing. As the water seeps into the gauze to a greater extent than the sulfathiazole crystals, a small collection of pure crystals in water, looking like fresh white mud, is left on the gauze.

Advantages Asserted
Advantages of the micro-crystalline sulfathiazole are that it does not cake on the impetigo area as powdered sulfa drugs do, and does not form a crust with the matter oozing from the sores, as sulfa drug ointments do. Instead the white mud-like sulfa crystals on the dressing get right into the fluid in and about the sores where they can act more effectively to stop the infection.

When the dressing is removed the following day a dry pink spot is present where the impetigo sore had been. New skin grows in and the pink color fades within a few days without further treatment. No new sores developed in any of the 15 children treated, nor did any new cases develop in the two outbreaks after the first ones had had their single white sulfa mud treatment.

FAMED CIRCUS AERIALIST NOW RUNS WALTERIA SHOP

It was just a decade or so ago when, roaring through the Big Top, came the phrase that tingled the spines of circus enthusiasts: "Allez-ooop!"

For one breathless moment, time stood still. The Codonas, greatest of all trapeze artists, were ready for their death-defying, dangerous and world-famous triple somersault.

"He made it!" shrieked millions of voices the world around, as Lalo Codona skillfully caught his brother, Alfredo Codona, as they flew through the air with muscles of steel, 60 feet above ground.

Old Days Recalled
Lalo Codona recalls those days as he works now at a trade fair removed from swinging high in the Big Tops of America and Europe.

Today he runs a machine shop specializing in wheel alignment in the town of Walteria. "I only have one regret from the old days," sighed Lalo Codona, now 44, a beret perched rakishly on the side of his head and his once-lithe but now slightly paunched physique enveloped in workmen's overalls.

"In 1933 we performed at the Winter Garden in Berlin. "And right under us sat one Adolf Hitler. "Gosh, if only I had had a good strong monkey-wrench!"

Sister Retired
His sister, Victoria, world-famous too as a wire-walking artiste, and now married to W. K. Adolph of Walteria, also has retired from circus life. Alfredo, who killed himself and his second wife in 1937 in Long Beach, before the tragedy joined his brother and sister in the Southern California town.
