

Triple Collision Results in No Injuries Sunday

Three cars were damaged, two of them almost wrecked, but no one was seriously hurt in a triple collision Sunday night at Sepulveda blvd. and Arlington ave. More than two hours later one of the motorists involved was found asleep on the curb in the 2100 block on Torrance blvd., by police who asserted he was intoxicated.

The sleeper was Thelmer B. McCowan, 36, Redondo Beach, who was booked for intoxication and later released on \$25 bail to appear for trial Saturday.

According to police reports, McCowan was driving west on Sepulveda when he struck a car being driven south on the same street by Glenn Cook of Arroyo, knocking Cook's machine into a car operated by Mrs. Margaret Ann Gabelich, 36, of San Pedro, who was halted to observe the boulevard stop on the west side of Arlington.

Mrs. Gabelich told investigating officers that McCowan was driving at a high rate of speed and his machine turned over after ramming Cook's car and driving it into her auto. No citations were issued.

A WHOLE GROUP of War Ration Stamps are enjoying their last days of usefulness. It will be wise to make immediate selections of the rationed items you need before stocks are depleted and ahead of the last minute rush that is sure to occur.

Red stamps E, F, G and H; and sugar stamp number 12, will expire on Monday, May 31. Coffee stamp number 23 expires on Sunday, May 30. Blue stamps G, H, and J have been given an additional week of validity by the OPA, and are now to be effective through June 7. OPA officials advise using ration stamps before their final effective days. That is, of course, if you need the foods that the stamps permit you to buy.
