

Meat Point Values Increase


With beef for civilians in July expected to be scarcest since rationing began, ration values of beef went up one point per pound on July 4. The new point value for beef, placing the ration cost of most preferred cuts at from nine to 13 points per pound, appear on the fourth official table effective to Aug. 1. One to two-point rises of a few

cuts of veal, lamb and mutton are also in effect, including leg of veal, veal cutlets, veal loin and rib chops, and similar lamb-mutton cuts.

Canned fish items, except canned oysters, have been raised to 12 points per pound, an increase of four points. Oysters are listed at five points per pound, up two points. Reductions in point values are chiefly in fats, oils and dairy products group. Margarine and lard are reduced one point, to four points per pound.

RATIONING TIME TABLE

RED STAMPS—(for meat, canned fish, canned milk, most edible oils and cheeses.) Stamp Q good through July 31.

BLUE STAMPS—(for canned, frozen and certain dehydrated foods. Stamps N, P and Q valid through Aug. 7.

COFFEE—Stamp 21 good for one pound through July 21.

SUGAR—Stamp 13 good for 5 pounds through Aug. 15. Stamps 15 and 16 good for 5 pounds each for home canning purposes.

SHOES—Stamp 18 good for one pair through Oct. 31.

GASOLINE—No. 6 coupons in "A" books good for 4 gallons through July 21. Save "A" book covers as they must be turned in with applications for new "A" book before July 21. Application blanks for new "A" Books now available at gas stations.

TIRE INSPECTION—"B" book cars, next tire inspection deadline, Oct. 31 and every 4 months thereafter; "C" book cars, next tire inspection deadline Aug. 31. "A" book cars, next tire inspection deadline Sept. 30.

WAR RATION BOOK—Thousands of Book 3 have already been mailed back to Southern California applicants. Your name is already on the book but you MUST fill in your address, age, sex, weight, height, complexion, then sign your name in the space provided on the cover.

RATION BOARD OFFICE HOURS—At 2300 Carson st., daily from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Memorial Held for Mulkern, Jr., Killed in Africa

Only a few days after he was reported saved when his ship was torpedoed off the coast of Africa, John J. Mulkern, Jr., former well known Narbonne high school student, a storekeeper in the Navy, was killed June 21 in an auto accident in North Africa while delivering supplies. His mother, Mrs. John Mulkern, Sr., is reported in a state of collapse at the family home, 847 Norton st., Los Angeles.

A memorial Mass for the 28-year-old Navy man was held this morning by Rev. Victor J. Follen at St. Gregory's Catholic church in Los Angeles.

Mr. and Mrs. Mulkern were notified last Wednesday of their son's death. The elder Mulkern has been in the Navy for 40 years and now is a warrant gunner, stationed at San Pedro. "Mickey" Mulkern, who attended Loyola University, also leaves his wife, Frances, an expectant mother; and a sister, Mrs. Winifred McGuehan, who is visiting at the family home from her residence in Kansas City.

Mulkern was a debater and yell leader at Narbonne and at Loyola was active in the young people's group of Catholic societies in the harbor area.

His father, a member of the Fleet Reserve and retired officer, returned to active service when the Navy called the reserves in 1940 and Mickey enlisted then.
