Older Men are Now Eligible for Naval Reserve Commissions

To meet the need for more officers in the Navy's rapidly-expanding seven-sea fleets, two changes have been made in the qualifications necessary to receive a commission in the Naval Reserve, according to Rear Adm. I. C. Johnson, U.S.N. (ret.), director of Naval Officer Procurement for the 11th Naval district.

Admiral Johnson announces that the age limit for officers has now been raised to 35, making men of 49 to 35 eligible to wear the gold stripes of Naval officers serving in general sea duty classifications.

He also said that eye requirements have been lowered to 15/20 from 18/20, correctible with glasses to 20/20 vision. Candidates must have a college degree or two years of college with from three to five years of business or professional experience, and must be men of forceful personality, preferably those who have participated in collegiate athletics, Admiral Johnson declared. He advised qualified candidates to apply immediately at the office of Naval Officer Procurement, 411 West Fifth st., Los Angeles.

Swedish Runner En Route Home After Successful Tour

Under the Wonder Hagg, the rangy Swede who came to this country a few weeks ago to run for the benefit of the Army Air Forces Aid Society, is now on his way back to his own country. Hagg's appearances helped the A.A.U. to raise close to \$150,000 for the fund.

Hailed as the greatest distance runner the world has yet known, Hagg set some new American records, although he failed to come through with the long-awaited four minute mile. Competition here included the best this country affords at the present date, but lacked the real class that might have been supplied by such men as Glenn Cunningham, Chuck Fenske, Lou Zamperini, Walter Mohl, or Gene Vonske, men who made running history during their heyday, but who are now either retired from the game or are in the armed services.

Hagg's records here include a new American mark in the 2 mile, 8:51.3 set at Cincinnati, Aug. 7; mile, 4:05.3 at Boston, July 24. Other marks set were 5000 meters, New York, June 24, 14:48.4; 2-mile, Chicago, July 2, 9:02.8; mile, San Francisco, July 17, 4:12.3, which failed to lower Lou Zamperini's Pacific Coast record of 4:11.6; mile, Cleveland, July 31, 4:05.4; 2-mile, Los Angeles, July 10, 8:53.8, and mile, New York, Aug. 11, 4:06.9.

Trout Fishing Good Throughout State

The wardens of the Fish and Game Commission report that trout streams throughout the state are low and clear, and in an excellent condition for fly fishing. In Inyo county all lakes are furnishing good fishing, as well as is the Owens rivers through Long Valley and the gorge. The Kern river is now at its best for fly fishing, the division announces, although smaller streams in Kern county have been heavily fished and do not offer much good sport.
