

The show is open to the public without charge.

Public to View Army In Action This Weekend

The nearest thing to a blitzkrieg ever seen in an American city will come to Los Angeles on Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 11 and 12 when the United States Army will stage a gigantic display of fighting men and material in action!

Virtually every piece of ground fighting equipment now being used by our forces in all theaters of war will be exhibited and demonstrated. The show will be held in Exposition park and in the Coliseum at 38th and Figueroa sts. in Los Angeles. Admission is free to the public—both to the grounds and to the spectacular thrill show in the Coliseum. The show is being presented by the Ordnance Training Center at Camp Santa Anita.

The park will be thrown open to the public at noon on Saturday and the show will be continuous throughout both days until closing time at 6 p.m. Sunday. No evening shows will be held.

Visitors will see tanks, jeeps, amphibious vehicles, guns, small arms and other equipment actually demonstrated on the park grounds. A special exhibit of Japanese equipment captured on Attu will be on display. Official War Department films showing the bombing of Tokyo and the Battle of the Bismarck sea will be shown in the State Exposition building on the park grounds. Like all other phases of the show, this, too, will be free.

Highlight of the show will be the thrilling reenactment of an actual battle in the Coliseum. Spectators will see our forces capture an enemy village. Machine guns, cannon and mortar fire, tanks and motorized armoured vehicles will add to the realism of this spectacle. Those witnessing this show will have grandstand seats at an actual battle—a privilege never before accorded civilians.

Transportation Problem Coming Up at Compton

Southwest transportation matters will be discussed at a meeting of the Harbor District Chamber of Commerce highway and traffic committee with representatives of the Southside Chamber of Commerce and other civic organizations at Compton today. Following the committee meeting in the afternoon a dinner session will be held in the evening with the Compton Chamber of Commerce as the host organization.

The discussion of carrier service problems will be brought before the Harbor District Chamber of Commerce, consisting of 66 community groups at the general evening session.

Reductions in service in the Southwest's network of inter-connecting transportation systems has ranked residents of the various areas ever since its inception under a blanket order of the O.D.T., when reduction in facilities serving some sections and increases in others were directed.

The civic groups are backing up their demands for improved service on the strength of the acknowledgment by other government agencies that the Southwest is one of the most important war production areas in the nation . . . a designation of the district as a critical housing area being based upon the tremendous influx of war workers and their families from out of state and from rural California districts.

Richard Frey's Burial In Plot At Sawtelle

Following an inquest at the office of Coroner Frank Nance in Los Angeles, the body of Richard Frey, who lived at 24005 Ocean ave., Waverly, was removed from the county morgue and the remains buried in the cemetery at the National Military Home at Sawtelle last week.

Frey, an oil worker, 50 years of age, was struck while crossing the Pacific Coast highway at Lucille ave., by an automobile driven by Woodrow Wilson Pickens of 2302 West 20th st., Long Beach on Tuesday evening last week.


Pickens stated he did not see Frey in time to avoid hitting the man. Frey was taken to the Torrance hospital for emergency treatment and removed to the general hospital where he died Friday.

Pickens was exonerated at the inquest and the death was pronounced accidental. Chief Investigator of the California Highway Patrol who made the investigation, reported.




