With schools in this area preparing for the opening of the 1943-44 year, motorists were warned this week to drive with special caution in the vicinity of school grounds.



### Navy Housing Units East of Alameda St.

To meet the needs of essential immigrant civilian employees of the Navy establishments at Terminal Island, N.H.A. today has authorized the construction by private builders of 500 units to be located west of Atlantic, south of Carson, and east of Alameda st. These units will rent for \$38 to \$42.50 and \$50 basic shelter rent for one, two and three-bedroom units. Supplementing this program for the Navy, a project of 500 temporary stop-gap housing units will be constructed at federal expense in the same area.

The housing just authorized brings to Los Angeles county a total of 14,000 family dwelling units given approval by the National Housing Agency within the past three months, according to Kevin C. Vanderlip, senior housing representative, National Housing Agency, Los Angeles.

### Farmers May Wait Until Dec. 15 to File Tax Reports

Many farmers will be among the 15 million Americans who are required to file a declaration of estimated income for 1943 and make a payment on that basis under the "Pay-as-You-Go" plan which became effective July 1, this year. Sept. 15 is the date for filing declarations, except that farmers, if they wish, may wait until Dec. 15, since they receive the bulk of their income in the fall.

Individuals or couples with an income of \$100 or more from sources other than wages are required to file, if their total income is such that they must pay an income tax. Individuals who were required to file an income tax return in 1942 and whose wages subject to withholding for 1943 will be less than for 1942 must also file.

### Warren Appoints Highway Commission

Gov. Warren has named his new highway commission which will replace the temporary board appointed shortly after his inauguration. The new board will consist of C. Arnold Smith, a San Diego banker and manufacturer; James Guthrie, San Bernardino publisher; Harrison Baker, Pasadena realtor; Chester Warlow, Fresno banker; Homer P. Brown, Placerville manufacturer, and Walter Sandoin, Ukiah hotelman.
