Post-War Road Program Mapped By Civic Group

Post-war highway construction appeared as the major subject for discussion at the annual session of the Harbor District Chambers of Commerce last week in which approximately \$3,000,000 was mapped for construction in the peace days to come, according to a release from the highway committee of the organization, of which Loren Howe of Hawthorne is chairman.

Howe said that this list with estimates was submitted by county engineers, and that it includes only a portion of the network which ultimately will be laid out. Streets will be improved, boulevards will be widened, curbs, gutter and new pavement will be put in where required and dead ends will be eliminated to make the network as nearly perfect as possible, Howe said.

Cost estimates and the proposed job locations are as follows: Santa Fe ave., widening and paving from Carson st. to Olive st., and from Logg Beach city to Compton, \$755,000; improving Pacific blvd. into Long Beach, including a bridge over the Los Angeles river, \$703,500; Alameda blvd., Florence ave. to Compton ave., \$188,978; Slauson ave., including bridge over river, \$80,000; Gage ave., Alameda blvd. to Hooper st., \$36,500; Carson st., Cherry ave. to Lakewood blvd., \$15,000; Century blvd., Van Ness st. to Alameda blvd. and Hawthorne blvd. to Anza st., now under way, \$27,000; Compton blvd. from Slauson st. to Nadeau st., \$107,845; Crenshaw blvd. from Ingiewood blvd. to Redondo Beach blvd., \$50,000.

El Segundo blvd. from Wilmington blvd. to Alameda blvd.; improving Ingiewood - Redondo blvd., \$343,470; Normandie ave., Imperial blvd. to Gardena City, and from Gardena to 182nd st., \$129,250; Western ave. from Gardena south to Los Angeles city limits, \$85,000; 223rd st., Long Beach to Santa Fe ave., \$28,660; Willowbrook ave., Imperial blvd. to Compton, \$30,000; Sepulveda (W. 104th) from Main st. to Normandie st., \$85,000; Rosecrans ave. from Atlantic blvd. to Compton, \$50,000; 108th st. from Denker to Arlington, \$40,000.

Delinquent Parents Dealt With Harshly In San Francisco

Almost every community in the state is painfully aware today that one of the greatest war-born problems is that of alarmingly increased juvenile delinquency. Virtually every town is wrestling with the problem for which "delinquent parents" seem to be more to blame than the youngsters.

In San Francisco, Police Chief Charles W. Dullea recently announced that mothers and fathers of young offenders will be arrested. And in Sacramento police have hailed into court the parents of a youngster 10 years old, on charges of failing to provide a proper home for him. Both were war workers and brought home a combined income of \$4000 annually.

On this subject the California Feature Service remarks: "Accompanying this shock treatment for parents, however, should be a broad educational program informing them of facilities available in their own communities for the safe amusement, care and guidance of children. Too few parents, generally speaking, know of or participate in the community work for the benefit of children. "Dads and mothers should make it their business to find out about such organizations, where they are located, how their facilities can be used, and also what they themselves can do to support and enhance public work in children's behalf. Deeds Accepted For Crenshaw Blvd. Widening

Widening of Crenshaw blvd. through the city of Gardena was advanced last week when the city council of the neighboring city accepted deeds of the western ten feet of lots 1 to 25 in the Gardena Park tract in West Gardena.

This property faces on the east side of Crenshaw blvd. and that portion of the street has been dedicated to the city at the request of Los Angeles county to prepare for the work to be done in the near future, making the boulevard 100 feet wide. Other properties were deeded to the city by Estates Incorporated for the purpose of opening 14th st. between Suro and Spinning aves. Four entire lots and the northerly 50 feet of six lots in the portion of the tract now being developed will be dedicated to the new street in an effort to solve the problem of dead-end streets in the district.

War Chest In State Slightly Exceeds Quota

The greatest war relief and welfare campaign ever conducted in California went over the top the past weekend as the state war chest drive surpassed its \$20,151,349 goal by nearly \$75,000, Ralph T. Fisher, president of the California War Chest, has announced.

Funds raised to date total \$20,224,777, while 39 of the 58 counties have met or exceeded quotas. Fisher paid high tribute to the campaign workers who served as volunteers in the hundreds of community drives making up the state-wide chest appeal. "The heroic effort of our army of volunteer workers has resulted in a real victory for our state," he declared. "We have raised more than double the amount previously realized in 'home-front' drives.

"Although the state goal has been reached, some of our California counties still are campaigning for funds. It is the responsibility of every worker in these counties to put forth his utmost now to attain the war chest goal. No campaign should be considered completed even in counties already over the top—until every potential giver has been offered the opportunity to contribute." The state president predicted a greater need for chest aid next year. "It has become increasingly apparent to our national leaders, as it has to all of us in state and local chests, that a 1944 war fund appeal is inescapable," he asserted. "The feeling seems to be general that under such circumstances we should conserve our organizational and other assets by all possible means. "We have done a pioneering job this year. We have learned more things about a national war state fund than we shall ever learn again in so short a time. We must certainly not scrap this knowledge and experience. And we must certainly not lose the devoted army of loyal men and women who in fact constitute the war chests."

The state-wide chest campaign provides financial support for services to the nation's armed forces, United Nations relief organizations, non-military welfare and health agencies and 17 national war-related causes for aid through the war chest.
