

### Wage Stabilization Schedule Issued by Tenth Regional WLB

Workers and employers in several major industrial groups who may be exploring wartime routes to higher pay, today were provided with the highest wage rates approvable on application to the Tenth Regional War Labor Board, the agency charged with responsibility for saying "yes" or "no" to wage adjustments.

Covered in the third list announced by the R.W.L.B. are key job classifications in the following industries:

Furniture manufacturing, garment manufacturing, binders and commercial job printing, paper box manufacturing, power laundries, motion picture studio janitors, policemen, automotive services and supply, auto mechanics, aluminum manufacturing, painting, varnish, and lacquer manufacturing, the casting, electroplating and bakery products manufacturing.

#### New Committeemen

On the committee, in addition to the board chairman, are another public member, James A. C. Grant of Los Angeles; industry members, George A. Bahrs of San Francisco, and Paul Shoup of Los Angeles and labor members, Chris T. Lehmann, A. F. of L. Los Angeles, and Arnold F. Campo, C.I.O., San Francisco.

The highest approvable rates are being set for all of the principal labor market areas throughout the Tenth War Labor Board Region, consisting of California, Arizona, and Nevada, in compliance with terms of the Wage Stabilization Act and with executive orders of the President, Neblett said.

The rate setting process is an essential part of the procedures under which the board grants or denies applications for wage increases tendered to it. Neblett explained, since it defines the limitations placed upon the board by the nation's wartime wage stabilization program.

Neblett stressed the fact that only in rare and unusual cases involving vital war production may increases above the established approvable rates be granted those seeking upward revisions of wages.

#### Must Be Approved

He also called the attention of all Los Angeles area employers and collective bargaining agencies to the regulations which forbid any wage adjustments, up or down, among establishments within the R.W.L.B.'s jurisdiction, without prior approval by the board.

All employers of more than eight persons are under board jurisdiction. In addition, the wages paid by employers of eight or less persons in shoe repair shops, tool and die shops, restaurants, hotels and hospitals come under W.L.B. jurisdiction.

Neblett urged persons with wage adjustment problems to call at the nearest office of the wage-hour division of the United States Department of Labor, where complete information on regulations and expert assistance in filing requests for adjustments is available.

He cautioned against attempts to bypass the R.W.L.B. field agents in the wage-hour offices. Manager George Pesner of Northrop urged all ball fans to come and see for themselves.

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### Epidemic Nausea Cases Reported By Dr. Gilbert

Epidemic nausea is rather prevalent in the Torrance-Lomita area and throughout Los Angeles county at the present time, advises Assistant County Health Officer, Dr. R. O. Gilbert.

"Epidemic nausea, or winter vomiting disease as it is sometimes called, resembles influenza in that it produces generalized aching," stated Dr. Gilbert. "It is characterized by abdominal cramp-like pains, vomiting and prostration. It may or may not be accompanied by diarrhea."

Dr. Gilbert said that attacks are usually of short duration, from 24 to 48 hours. Prompt recovery usually follows, although some weakness may be noticed for a few days. The condition is apparently caused by a virus similar to influenza and appears to be contracted through the upper respiratory tract. It is sometimes mistaken for food poisoning.

Health officials advise that this condition, which as a rule occurs in the winter, seems to be highly contagious. It spreads to immediate contacts within approximately 36 hours and then to contacts of the secondary cases and so on in an ever-widening circle until it reaches the limits of any social group.

While the disease is not serious, dehydration in very young children caused by persistent vomiting should have the attention of a physician, Dr. Gilbert warned.

### Jack Beene's Father Passes In Oklahoma

Jack Beene, local painting contractor, received word last week of the death of his father, George Samuel Beene, age 94, at Oklahoma City. Burial was made in McAlester, Okla. Besides his son, Jack, the deceased is survived by his wife, and two other sons, Edward of Kelly, Kan., and Norman, who is in the Navy on duty in the South Pacific.

Prior to his retirement, George S. Beene was a general contractor, and was widely known throughout his section of Oklahoma.

### War Veteran's Wife Former Torrance Girl

A veteran of fierce air battles over Guadalcanal and holder of the Distinguished Flying Cross, First Lieut. John D. Lindley, 27, of Delhi, Calif., is now serving in a squadron at Santa Barbara commanded by Maj. Joe Foss, famous Marine ace.

Lieut. Lindley, who came up from the ranks to a commission in the Marine Corps, left for Guadalcanal on Aug. 20, 1942, with one of the first combat organizations, landed on Henderson field and met the enemy in combat the following day. He was then a staff sergeant.

During his first flight his plane was badly shot up and he was forced to make a crash landing on Henderson field. He climbed into another craft and returned to the fray in which he knocked down two Japanese planes.

He was commissioned a second lieutenant in the field and on that day received the Distinguished Flying Cross.

Lieut. Lindley enlisted in the Marine Corps in 1938 and received flight training at Pensacola, Fla., in 1941 after having served for several months in Hawaii.

His wife is the former Adabarr Marsh of Torrance. They have one daughter, Snerry, aged 2 1/2.

### State Guard Inactive Officers Resigning

Brig. Gen. Ray W. Hays, state adjutant general, revealed today he has received about 250 resignations since Oct. 19 from officers in the inactive list of the state guard.

Hays said he expects to receive about 350 more, and that if he does not receive the resignations "after a reasonable time" he will act to cancel commissions of officers to whom he wrote a letter Oct. 19 requesting their resignations.

The adjutant general emphasized that the resignations currently being received do not include those of 564 officers of the state militia whose commissions were cancelled between July and Sept. 1.

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### Gas Companies Cut Deliveries To Industries

A statement issued by Southern California Gas Co. officials on the gas supply situation today, explains conditions which have affected deliveries of full industrial consumers recently.

"Present winter conditions with relative low temperatures have made it necessary for the gas company to curtail deliveries of surplus gas to industrial customers in order to meet the heavy demand of essential civilian users and the most critical war operations, as designated by the government, the statement reads.

"Due to the greatly increased war demand for gas in Southern California added to the fact that it has not been feasible for the gas companies here to materially enlarge their pipeline and storage facilities, total essential requirements for gas approach delivery capacities more nearly than in previous years.

"Industries for many years have been using surplus natural gas at low rates under contracts which provide that service will be discontinued whenever the gas is needed to supply essential civilian and war industry requirements during the recent cold spell."
