

Measles Epidemic Reported on Rise in L. A. County

Measles continues to rise steadily in Los Angeles County, 924 new cases having been reported last week, according to figures just released by the County Health Department.

"This represents an attack rate nearly ten times that of the average non-epidemic year," indicated Assistant County Health Officer R. O. Gilbert. "Nevertheless, incidence of the disease is still below that of the epidemic two years ago," he added.

Health department reports reveal that whooping cough, chickenpox and other communicable diseases are well within the bounds of normal expectancy.

Classics on Ice Ballet at Shrine Auditorium Saturday

Opening Saturday matinee, April 1, to a brilliant first-night audience composed of film notables, socialites and civic leaders, "Classics on Ice" will present a world premiere of combined ice and stage ballet at the Shrine Auditorium. Starring in this unique presentation is Jeanne Sook, former star of the "Ice Follies," and her Snow Maidens in collaboration with the Theodore Kosloff Russian Ballet.

Owing to difficulties encountered in obtaining material under present conditions, "Classics on Ice," scheduled for March 31 and April 1 and 2, has been postponed to April 1 and will be presented again on April 2, 3 and 4. Seats are on sale at the box office and all Mutual agencies.

A lavish program of classic and modern ballet with a number of unusual and vivid diversissements has been planned. Especially arranged for simultaneous ice and stage presentation are the ballets "Chopin's Memories," "Hungarian Rhapsody," "Clair de Lune," "Rhapsody in Blue" and "Orpheus." Guest artists on the program include Sergei Tavasieff, who will perform his famous Russian sword dance which recently won him acclaim from Stalin, President Kalinin and Marshall Voroshiloff on a recent tour of the Soviet Republic, and Antonio Triana and his Spanish Dancers, who will perform "Capriccio Espagnole" and "Fire Dance." In addition the Theodore Kosloff Ballet will be seen in a group of classic and contemporary dances. The music is under the direction of Rodion Mendelievitch and the ice directress is Angela Anders, Swiss skating champion.

Kite Contests Staged Sunday By Cub Packs

The Torrance and Lomita Cub Packs are sponsoring a kite flying contest next Sunday afternoon, April 2, starting at 2 p.m. The meet is to be held across the Pacific Coast highway from the entrance to the Lomita Flight Strip of the U. S. Army. It was announced by George B. Thatcher, one of the Cub Pack leaders.

Thatcher advised that there are to be prizes given for the highest, largest and smallest flying kites. There will be other prizes, too, for the best flying box kite and the Cub Pack having the largest group participating in the contest.

Joel Hagberg, assistant Scout field commissioner, will be one of the judges. Others will be selected from Torrance and Lomita.

Walteria Play Project Cost Told by Jain

When the Youth Commission recommended appropriation of \$300 for improvement of city-owned lots at Walteria for improvement as a playground for children the commission members apparently didn't count on what the actual cost might be, according to Glen Jain, Torrance city engineer, to whom the matter was referred after the council had acted favorably on the request.

Jain reported Tuesday night that the location was not altogether desirable, that the soil there consists mostly of adobe and would require hauling in of a large amount of gravel and other material for surfacing. He estimated the expense would be approximately \$700 plus labor, which would hike the cost to more than \$1000.

The council referred the matter back to the Youth Commission, in spite of the fact that at least one member of the council—who is up for re-election—spoke in favor of the increased expenditure.

Paul Slonecker, president of the Walteria Civic Organization, later informed the Herald that it was not the intention of the Walteria body to request such a large appropriation for recreational equipment and that he favors limiting the improvements for play courts to approximately \$300 as originally planned. Slonecker explained that the site proposed for play courts was originally purchased by the city as a library site and he feared that if permanent pavement for tennis courts, etc., were installed that the opportunity of later using the land for a library building would be lessened. He suggested that if the site were merely graded instead of being paved, the tennis courts could be installed without exceeding the \$300 originally appropriated.

Renewal of leases for the Palos Verdes Library District at \$2,112 per year, and with the city of Torrance for library quarters at \$7,408 per year, were approved by the Board of Supervisors at Tuesday's meeting.
