Time-and-Half for Firemen on Emergency Call

mine how the "overtime" problem was handled in his department. Stroh said his men all consider they are subject to call at any time, as provided by city ordinance.

Will Use Radio

As the matter now stands, the fire chief can call to duty any member of his department in an emergency and if the fireman can be located he is duty-bound to report. To facilitate this procedure, the council instructed City Engineer Glenn M. Jain to install electric wiring between the fire station and the police sergeant's office so that in case of a second alarm during a fire information may be relayed via the police radio to the fire chief or captain at the scene of the first blaze.

Mayor McGuire established the fact that while the fire department rolling equipment is fitted with two-way radio sets at present, they are not used, nor are firemen specifically trained to operate them. Capt. Benner called the council's attention to the fact that while there are three fire trucks at the central station, on some days only two men are on duty and he advocated an increase in personnel in the department.

Other Business

The council attended to other business during the adjourned session. Ordinance No. 354 was passed on second and final reading. It grants permission to the National Supply Company to install or remove certain pipe lines beneath city thoroughfares.

The council authorized Chief of Police Stroh, City Judge Otto Willett and C. Z. Ward, manager of the municipal bus lines, to attend sessions of the California Traffic Safety Assembly at the Biltmore Hotel, Los Angeles, April 12, 13 and 14.

Councilman Cucci served notice he will seek passage of an ordinance repealing the present weed abatement measure, which requires the city to serve notice in writing to property owners to remove weeds from property. The cost of so notifying the owners is prohibitive, he said.

The council authorized signing of an agreement with William Agee where Agee will receive \$50 per month and 10 percent of all municipal bus line tickets he sells at the Hill st. de-
