FWA Approves Trunk Sewer On Crenshaw

Supervisor Haug has just received news through the Federal Works Agency that the federal government has appropriated \$35,000 for payment of cost of the Willowbrook-Lynwood trunk sewer. The County Sanitation District made application to the government to have these sewers financed and paid for out of the money provided under the Lanham Act. This trunk line sewer runs along the west side of Compton Creek from Cressy st. northerly to 120th st. produced, thence west along 120th st. produced to Central ave.

The Federal Works Agency has also appropriated \$152,000 for the trunk line sewer known as the Lennox-Lawndale-Gardena Unit No. 1. This trunk line sewer runs from the pumping plant at 174th and Gramercy, northerly in Gramercy to the Pacific Electric tracks, just south of 166th place, thence westerly to Arlington, thence northerly in Arlington to Rosecrans, thence westerly on Rosecrans to Crenshaw, thence northerly on Crenshaw to 135th st. This trunk line will provide the outlet for the Crenshaw Villa Sewer project, otherwise known as the Lemol Street Improvement, and will enable sewers to

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
