

Two New Mail Routes Started In Torrance

Two additional city routes have been permanently established by Torrance postoffice, it has been announced by Postmaster C. Earl Conner. This brings to six the number of city routes, and in addition, there are two rural routes. They have been in operation since April 1, but are now regularly established, Conner said. The postoffice will be closed all day July 4, Tuesday, and there will be no mail delivery, Conner announced.

City to Try Ethyl Gas In Its Equipment

Because city equipment will not operate on ordinary gasoline, the City Council Tuesday night authorized a 60-day trial of ethyl gas—to see if it works. The city is losing much manpower and time trying to make equipment work on the cheap fuel. It also was decided to rent a motor patrol grader from Redondo Beach city street department at prevailing rates.

Rodeo Use of Torrance Park Is Authorized

H. C. Callahan, chairman of the Torrance Annual Rodeo Committee, was given the permission of the City Council Tuesday night to conduct the Second Annual Torrance Rodeo at Torrance ball park on some Saturday and Sunday in August, the date to be fixed later. Plans are being laid for the affair and Councilman C. M. Gilbert moved that the permission be granted. He is chairman of the council's recreation commission.

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Santa Fe Request For Right-of-Way Is Delayed

At the objection of Councilman N. H. Cucci, the City Council Tuesday night delayed the request of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad for renewal of right of way through the city. The right of way, granted for 21 years from July 10, 1923, is expiring. Cucci asked that the matter be further discussed, due to complaints of smoke from the locomotives and excessive standing across city streets, causing traffic tieups. The matter was referred to City Attorney J. E. McCall for report on July 11.

Postmaster Wants to Hire Automobile

Torrance postoffice wants to hire a car without a driver, according to Postmaster C. Earl Conner. Bids will be taken, on an hourly basis, up to July 5. The car is wanted for the quarter ending Sept. 30, and a sedan or light truck is desired. It will be used approximately five hours a day to deliver and relay mail, or a total of about 300 hours. Bids should be on an hourly basis. No Sunday or holiday use of the car will be required, the postmaster said.

City Employee Holiday Plan Is Rejected

If city employees who do not work on Saturday want to lay off Monday and get in a four-day holiday, they may do so at their department heads' permission but at their own expense. A request that they be permitted to work Saturday and lay off Monday, forfeiting double time pay on Saturday, was denied. The council left it up to the department heads to work out the situation.

George M. Green was given another one-year contract for collection and disposing of garbage, trash and bottles by the City Council Tuesday night. 
