Only sportsmen's clubs that apply and qualify will be mailed this monthly bulletin covering actions of the Fish and Game Commission and work accomplished by the bureaus of the division.

Each group that applies will receive an information form to be filled out, setting forth certain facts, names and addresses, and returned to the educational director, Division of Fish and Game, Ferry Building, San Francisco 11.

Issuance of "Sportsmen's Club Bulletins" will commence early in August.

### FAMED TEAMS TO PLAY IN BENEFIT HERE

Tomorrow is the night for the two big all-star novelty softball games to be played for the benefit of Torrance's Army hospital at the Municipal Ball Park. This event promises to be one of the most colorful and entertaining sports affairs seen around these parts in many a month. Featuring the widely-known ball club that has campaigned throughout Southern California under the banner of Mickey Rooney's "Bumpy Bums," the program will provide for the personal appearance of many Hollywood headliners who will be on hand to display their entertaining talents for the crowd's delight and the hospital's benefit.

Definitely scheduled to appear is Robert Walker, the hilarious "Private Hargrove" of the recently released motion picture, who will act as master of ceremonies for the occasion. Buster Keaton, famous dead-pan star of many comedy hits, Beverly Hudson, up and coming singing and dancing starlet, and other notables will also be on hand. Standing in for Mickey Rooney himself, who is now in the Army, will be his father, Joe Yule, old time vaudeville star.

The doubleheader will open with a game between two outstanding girls' softball clubs, the Torrance Girls team and the "Cannonettes" from the Cannon Electric Co. of Los Angeles. The second game will feature Mickey Rooney's "Bumpy Bums" and the "Ducks" from the McDonald Mfg. Co. of Los Angeles. All these teams have good records and the night should provide a maximum share of thrills and highlights.

Tickets, at the flat price of \$1.00, including the 17 cent tax, may be obtained from Harry Lewis, secretary of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce, the J. C. Penney Co., all day any day, at various defense plants and at the box office of the ball park.

Torrance residents who cannot attend the game have been urged to buy tickets and give them to soldiers who are patients at the Army hospital here, thus assuring them a chance to see the game and at the same time supporting the recreation fund of the hospital.

#### CITY VOTES FUNDS FOR RODEO HERE

Planned as a U.S.O. benefit performance, the Torrance Second Annual Rodeo now has city sponsorship, the City Council Tuesday night yielding to the petition of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce for an allowance of \$500 to pay half of the advertising and incidental costs of the affair.

The rodeo will be staged in Torrance Municipal park on Saturday night and Sunday, Aug. 19 and 20, under the chairmanship of H. C. "Curley" Callahan, ex-Nevada cowboy now "herding" buses for the city.

The first annual rodeo drew more than 5,000 people to Torrance, and an equal attendance or more is anticipated this year. James L. Lynch, president of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce, told the council that the proceeds from the program sales will be devoted to the U.S.O. activities here.

He declared: "It is felt that this rodeo, if handled as we have planned, will be of inestimable advertising value and benefit to the city of Torrance, inasmuch as we are advertising the event in all of the newspapers in the Torrance trade area, in addition to Los Angeles, Long Beach and rodeo trade magazine. The posters and handbills will also have a wide distribution and all of the ribbons and cups awarded for the parade will serve as a lasting advertisement for the city."

The out-of-town visitors will spend a considerable sum of money in the city of Torrance during their two-day stay, which will aid the local merchants.

"This group is canvassing the City Council for the sum of \$500 toward the estimated advertising cost of approximately \$1,000, believing that sum to be a fair proportionate share of the outlay in behalf of publicizing the city of Torrance."

#### PRISON CAMPS SUPPLIED

Award of the Distinguished Flying Cross to T/Sgt. Lee E. Draper, 25, 1020 Cravens ave., Torrance, crew chief and turret gunner on a Flying Fortress in France, has just been announced by the Army Air Forces.

Sgt. Draper, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Draper of Torrance, already has the Air Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters and by this time probably has completed his 25th mission, which ordinarily would entitle him to a furlough and possibly a trip home. His parents think that the invasion possibly may delay the furlough, however. Draper's father works in a steel plant here.

No details of Draper's heroic acts which won him the flying cross were given in the report of the citation.


