City to Ask Government Post-War Fund

The City Council Tuesday night authorized City Engineer G. M. Jain to apply for \$12,900 government funds for postwar planning and specifications for improvements in the City of Torrance.

It is a matched money deal, the city being required to match the aid if it is allowed. The money is available, Jain told the council, from the government.

POSTAL RECEIPTS REACH \$106,773 REFLECTING BIG TORRANCE AREA GROWTH

Torrance postoffice hit another milestone in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1944, with 12-months postal receipts reaching \$106,773.99.

This figure is nearly three times the total receipts of 1940, when the local unit became a Postmaster C. Earl Conner. It took receipts of \$45,285.81 to make a first class office out of Torrance.

The figures for the past year reflect the tremendous growth of business of Torrance, it was said.

A gain of \$28,828.41 was registered over the \$77,944.68 total receipts for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1943, was \$55,827.66, and in 1941, \$45,528.69.

Postmaster Conner estimates that the business for the calendar year, upon which postoffice grades are determined, will reach \$125,000.

In the final quarter of the fiscal year, April, May and June, the receipts were \$29,486.11, as compared with \$21,485.05 for the similar quarter of last year.

From 1917 to 1943 Federal Aid and emergency highway appropriations totaled \$3,745,000.00 exclusive of WPA or like relief allocations.


Fourth Offender Spending 60 Days In County Jail

Ticket Agent Still Waiting For Contract

Ticket Agent Carl Marsteller at the Los Angeles Torrance Municipal Bus line depot still has no contract with the city.

Each week, faithfully, Marsteller appears at the council meetings to discuss the situation and arrive at an understanding. Each week, it is promised that the matter will be taken care of at once.

Tuesday night the council again told Marsteller that the Transportation Engineer Charles F. Koors will see him about the deal. That was the same thing they have been telling him for weeks.

On the basis of the contract submitted, Marsteller would receive 10 percent of the ticket sales at the Los Angeles agency or \$230.50 for last month, \$50 a month for janitor services, and his income from sale of magazines, cigars and other merchandise.

City Court Fines For June Total \$1402, Says Judge

According to report of City Judge Otto B. Willett, in June the City Court of the City of Torrance received \$1402 net from fines and fees. Of this sum \$739 are general fund monies, while \$663 came from vehicle violations and thus are road fund monies.

Two small claims cases were filed during this month, making a total of \$2.00. General fund monies were collected from the following cases: Drunkenness, \$290.50; parking, \$70.00; boulevard stop, \$138.50, and miscellaneous criminal violations, \$240.00.

Vehicle code funds were derived from the following cases: Drunk driving, \$469.00; speed and reckless driving, \$159.00, and miscellaneous traffic violations, \$33.00.

ALUZING FIRM BUYS LAND HERE

The Aluzing Corporation of Indianapolis, Ind., has purchased the northern part of the Torrance Industrial Properties, on the east side of Border avenue at 222nd street, and plans are under way for altering existing buildings for production of vital war materials, Wm. A. Drennan, who sold the property, has announced. The company will continue operation after the war on a peacetime basis, he said.

The firm, which owns deposits of ores and clays in Utah, Nevada and Arizona, which it will use in its process with aluminum, is headed by C. W. Day and is owned by his family. Day is commissioner of securities of the State of Indiana.

The output of the plant here will be an essential war product for the duration and the firm is said to have a big backlog of orders to fill after the war.

Several officials of the corporation are in Southern California now, Drennan said, and the decision to select the Torrance location was due to its central industrial situation between Los Angeles and the harbor district, with electric rail line facilities connecting both.

Details of the purchase, Drennan said, were handled by E. C. Woodard of W. I. Hollingsworth & Co.
