RATION-POINT FREE FOOD PRODUCED BY COMMUNITY CANNERY IN GARDENA

One thousand cans of apricots in a day! Four hundred cans of beets and beans in a day! And perfect confidence that the product will keep and be safe to eat. That is what is happening at the community cannery for Gardena Valley.

Housewives bring in fruit that is home-grown or purchased individually. Sometimes the group buys and puts up ten crates of vegetables and prates the product and expense. At any rate, good food is put on family cupboard shelves, food that is ration point free and will deprive neither soldiers nor toilers of other needed supplies. To date, fruits in season have been the main interest, including cherries, berries, apricots, plums, beets and snap beans. A trial run of sweet corn has been put thru, preparatory to quantities soon. Tomatoes will be a major item following peaches. Rabbits and chickens have been saved for future use. Any food can be safely preserved there for 7 cents a can, plus the product.

Capt. Roberts, nutrition expert of the Federal Government, has visited the Gardena Valley and the Van Nuys projects and was very much pleased with the arrangements and enthusiasm. The local cannery is the result of cooperation between the City of Gardena, the Los Angeles Board of Education and the Federal Government, acting thru the State Bureau of Agricultural Education. A building on Gardena Park property at 158th st. and Normandie houses the work. Incidentally, the Gardena authorities are so enthused over the results that it is proposed to double the facilities.

Mrs. McClaskey, a nutrition expert, is especially trained and licensed by the state to direct this work. To insure safety of the product, all who take part in the work must have some preliminary training. This instruction is now given by Mrs. McClaskey at the cannery Monday mornings from 10-12. If after class meetings trainees can stay to watch activities they now can complete training in two sessions. Then they can make arrangements for their turn. Three hundred people have taken preliminary training. The as many as twenty have been working at one time, a schedule must be followed to assure fair opportunity to all who wish to use the equipment. One visitor, watching the interest and enthusiasm of cooperators, and admiring the product, suggests that this type of activity should be easily available to each community. Torrance residents may use these Gardena facilities this year, and the enthusiasm of a few may develop a similar program here another year.

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
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
