Batboy National Pitcher Stars In Calship Shutout of 6 to 0

Last Saturday night's ball game at the Torrance City Park diamond between the National Supply and the champion Calship outfit provided fans with enough excitement to last a couple of seasons and wound up in that often hoped for but seldom won event, a no-hitter, with the Nationals on the long end of a 6-0 score.

Manager Spud Murphy, with his second string catcher behind the plate, his ace pitcher due to leave the game at the end of three and a half innings, and no reserves in sight, was a mighty anxious bench sitter during the first half of the game.

However the Nats came through with three runs and gave Murphy a breather long enough to look around and pick out a sub for Kratofil, who had set down the Shipmen with no hits and no runs up to that point. In the first three frames the Calships could do nothing with Kratofil and nine men hit the dust in clock-like precision. In the fourth, it looked as if the break was due to arrive, when after two were gone, Kratofil walked two in a row, but the rally died when R. Chambers flied out to right field.

With no regular hurler in the bullpen, Manager Murphy looked around for a sub for Kratofil, and his eye lit on Batboy Moser, who has been itching for a chance to get into a game. He took over like a veteran, whiffing two in his half of the fifth and setting down three more in a row in the sixth. A strike-out and fast infielding put the last three Shipmen to bye-bye-land in the seventh, and when the dust rolled away a jubilant National Supply team found themselves the victors in a shut-out, no-hit game.

Young Moser, on top of his stellar pitching performance, batted 1.000, with a single his first time up and a walk for his second.

Gretlin, pitching for Calship, was nicked for eight hits but had his share of strikeouts, 11 Nationals going down for the count in the seven innings. Montgomery and Foster shared hitting honors for the Nats with two singles each, and Montgomery counted three of the Nationals' six runs, his second a close thing at the plate when Catcher R. Chambers dropped the ball.

Aug. 1 was an important day for deer hunters in California, when the season opened in fish and game districts 2 (except Mendocino County) and 3.

Starting on that date, deer hunting is permitted in the counties of Sonoma, Marin, Napa, Solano, Yolo and that portion of Colusa lying south of the Ukiah-Lake Tahoe highway; Alameda, Contra Costa, Santa Clara, San Francisco, San Mateo, Santa Cruz, Monterey, San Benito and Fresno lying in the Coast Range Mountains; Merced, Stanislaus and San Joaquin lying west of the San Joaquin River.

Care In Forest Fire Season Is Being Urged

Full cooperation of all residents of California, particularly new residents, toward prevention of forest and range fires is urged in a statement issued by Dr. Robert Gordon Sproul of Berkeley, chairman of the state-wide natural resources committee of the California State Chamber of Commerce.

Name Supplied in Burned Body Case Inquiry

Further search for someone who can identify the remains of a woman's body found July 7 in a burned over field at 223rd st. and Moneta ave., in county territory, was under way this week after members of the sheriff's homicide squad received information that may lead to solution of the mystery.

Homicide squad members acknowledged they received information that the woman's name may have been "Walters," they said. They had a faint suggestion from an undisclosed source that a woman with that name whose first name was said to be "Jennie" was beaten in March at an address not far distant from where the body was found.

No such name has been found on the missing persons list at the sheriff's office.

The body, in an advanced state of decomposition, was found after a mysterious fire swept across the field. A boy on a bicycle rode out into the field to investigate persistent flames at one spot and there he found clothing on the body still burning. Only scraps of the clothing were left when officers arrived there.

Articles that may help lead to identification of the woman are a pair of eyeglasses, the metal clasp and bottom weight of a burned purse, one shoe and a section of dental bridgework.

Zucchini Used For Bread-and-Butter Pickles

Zucchini, so plentiful at this time in Victory gardens, successfully substitutes for cucumbers in home recipes for bread-and-butter pickles, Miss Claribel Nye, state home demonstration leader, University of California, said today.

"The following tested and proven recipe has been used successfully," she continued. "Four quarts sliced zucchini, one quart pickling vinegar, two cups sugar, two teaspoons celery seed, two teaspoons tumeric, if available, one teaspoon ground mustard, one-half cup sack salt. Bring vinegar, sugar, salt and spices to a boil. Pour over freshly sliced vegetables and let stand one hour. Bring to a boil, cook for three minutes and seal hot in sterilized jars."

"Spicy condiments such as pickles add zest to wartime menus," Miss Nye added. "Also, it is a good way to use up an over-supply of zucchini in the Victory garden."
