Doak Workers Buy \$55,800 In War Bonds

Employees of the Doak Aircraft Company, Inc., dug determinedly into the pockets of their work clothes and came up with a record purchase of \$55,800 in war bonds for the Fifth War Loan, Edmond R. Doak, president, announced today.

Of the total, \$21,750 came in payroll deductions and \$34,050 in cash sales.

Doak attributed the spurt in sales to realization by employees that the invasion and final phase of the war must raise the cost not only in lives, but in expensive equipment as well.

FRANK FROHNHOEFER, SILVER STAR HERO, TELLS OF NARROW ESCAPE IN JAP-HELD JUNGLE

Telling in his own words the story of the action in a South Sea jungle in which, after his rifle had been shot out of his hands, four men in front and two behind him hit by enemy fire, he was able to crawl forward and with the aid of another soldier, save two across a river before and after him, miraculously missing the local man. A Sgt. Carroll aided Frohnhoefer in the rescue of the officer, Lt. Paul T. Gray, and the scout, Pvt. Jack Lenington.

His letter to Irene Frohnhoefer best tells the story of how he earned the Silver Star, though it was written May 7, 1944, a day or so after the action and long before he was decorated. It states, in part:

Story Told

"We were out further than anyone has ever been and on our third day out is when it happened. I was the fifth man from the front of the column, three machine guns and snipers opened up. They nailed the four in front of me, a burst of machine gun fire, the M. G. (machine gun) missed me and cut Frank's rifle out of his hands. By some act of God, Frank was not hit. Then under fire that hit me four more times, Frank and Sgt. Carroll came up and helped the scout, Jack Lenington, and I to safety. They made litters for Jack and I, with which the patrol marched through the Jap held jungle the rest of that day and that night and the rest of the next day.

Praises Soldier

"From that short description I hope I have been able to show you the fine work your husband has been doing. I want you to know that his officers and fellow soldiers think the world and all of him. But this should not seem strange to you that they feel such, you his wife. But among men one has to prove himself a man and Frank has gone beyond this and I am proud to have him, as a friend.

"He is now where living conditions are not the best and one can stand better if mail from home is there when one returns wet and tired from patrol. Believe me, I know.

"I pray for the day when you and Frank and others like him may return to enrich your life and his."

Passes Censor

"Base Censor: I'm not quite sure about his mention in general about men getting hit. If this violates the casualty rules will you cut out the taboo parts. It is an actual experience he had recently—James N. Olney, 1st Lt., Inf."

Another letter received by Mrs. Frohnhoefer was from Lt. Gray, dated July 28, 1944, and then a patient in Schick General Hospital, Clinton, Iowa, as a result of the wounds received in the action, told of his gratitude for the courage and bravery of

RATION FACTS

MEATS, FATS, ETC.—Book 4 red stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through C5 valid indefinitely.

PROCESSED FOODS—Book 4 blue stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through F5 valid indefinitely.

SUGAR—Book 4 stamps 30, 31 and 32 valid indefinitely for five pounds each, stamp 40 good for five pounds for home canning through Feb. 28, 1945.

Obtain application for additional canning sugar at local OPA boards. Application, when filled out, must be accompanied by spare stamp 37. Applicants may request up to 20 pounds per ration book. Second period applications may be filed on Oct. 20.

Ask your local OPA board for your consumer meat and grocery price lists.

SHOES—Book 3 airplane stamps 1 and 2 good indefinitely. Note: Take book along to make purchase.

GASOLINE—A12 coupons good for three gallons to Sept. 21. B2, B3, C2 and C3 coupons good for five gallons.

Save your tire inspection records. They must be presented when applying for a renewal of gas rations. Any request to replace any passenger car tire must be accompanied by all inspection records and a new notation from an authorized inspector that a new tire is needed.

Truck tire (T-Book drivers)—Every six months or every 5,000 miles.

Ammunition . . . will be available reasonably soon . . . we have been advised.


