BIKE RIDERS WARNED BY CHIEF STROH

With the beginning of school, hundreds of bicycles are being used daily to carry students to and from school and Chief of Police John Stroh declares that extreme care should be exercised to insure the safety of every bicyclist.

This means that each individual bicyclist should know how to handle his bicycle safely and expertly, and that he should obey the ten rules of the bicycle code:

1. Obey all traffic laws, signs and signals.
2. Ride at the extreme right of the street with traffic.
3. Ride single file—never two or more abreast.
4. Keep both hands on the handlebars and refrain from indulging in stunts.
5. Refuse to hitch a ride on another vehicle.
6. Carry all packages in a basket or attach securely where they will not interfere with steering, pedaling or vision.
7. Always ride single and refrain from carrying a passenger on the handlebar.
8. Keep your headlamp and rear reflector or light in good working order; have a horn or bell—and use it.
9. Use arm signals when you turn.
10. Dismount and walk across busy corners.

This quotation from Proverbs will be the Golden Text in the Sunday Lesson-Sermon on "Matter" in all branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston: "But thou set thine eyes upon that which is not? for riches certainly make themselves wings; they fly away as an eagle toward heaven."
Matthew relates that after Jesus had fed the multitude in the desert place, he "constrained his disciples to get into a ship, and to go before him unto the other side. . . . And in the fourth watch of the night Jesus went unto them, walking on the sea. And when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were troubled, saying, It is a spirit; and they cried out for fear. But straightway Jesus spake unto them, saying, Be of good cheer; it is I; be not afraid."
A citation from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy, reads: "God ordained a material law to annul the spiritual law. . . . Jesus walked on the waves, fed the multitude, raised the dead, and raised the dead in direct opposition to material law. His acts were the demonstration of Science, overcoming the false claims of material sense or law."

Other out of town speakers announced by Armstrong are Mrs. Charlotte D. Elmott, director of child guidance department of Santa Barbara public schools; Roy Sorenson, assistant general secretary of national council of YMCAs; and O. M. Close, chairman of California Youth Activity.

Among the well known local citizens interested in child welfare taking active part in the conference are Mrs. Rollin Brown, chairman of City War Council's committee on childhood and youth, chairman of the conference resolutions committee, and Mrs. Maynard Toll, president of Family Welfare Association; Mrs. Kendal Frost, member of board of directors of Children's Bureau; Dr. Robert A. McKibben, executive director, All Nations Foundation, and Dr. Raymond McKelvey, secretary, Southern California Conference of Inter-American Affairs, chairman of the various sessions.

Armstrong, executive secretary of L. A. County Tuberculosis and Health Association, will preside at morning and evening meetings.

The conference is sponsored jointly by Community Welfare Federation Council of Social Agencies, City Board of Education, County Board of Education, Coordinating Councils, City War Council, County War Council, California Youth Authority and Parent-Teacher Association. The first conference resulted in a far reaching program for the welfare of children in this area.
