A WAC recruiting office has been established in the Chamber of Commerce building at 1119 Sartori ave. for the purpose of answering the Army's urgent call for women of this vicinity to fill a great many vacancies in the Army today.

Women of Torrance and surrounding territory will now be able to enlist and secure first-hand information regarding the Women's Army Corps from army personnel on duty each Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the newly established office.

The Medical Corps of the United States Army has sent out an urgent plea to the patriotic women of America for 22,000 medical technicians to be trained in our army hospitals to give proper care and treatment to our wounded soldiers returning to the United States at the rate of 50,000 per month. Our hospitals are filled to overflowing with war veterans who are unable to be assured of proper care and treatment because of the lack of properly trained technicians necessary to meet the army's increasing demands.

State General Fund Excess Is \$146,000,240

State Controller Harry B. Riley today announced that the state's general fund cash excess over current obligations on Aug. 31, 1944, was \$146,000,240, as compared with an excess of \$126,047,434 at the end of the preceding month and an excess of \$96,564,615 on Aug. 31, 1943. The present cash excess, said Riley, represents an increase of \$19,952,806 over the figure for July 31, 1944. Of this increase, \$19,950,776 represents an excess of August revenues over expenditures. The remainder of the increase consists of \$2,030 of miscellaneous nonrevenue receipts.

General fund revenues deposited in the State Treasury during the first two months of the 96th fiscal year totaled \$41,296,075—a decrease of \$3,533,149 under collections for the same period last year. The major decrease in revenue occurred in the bank and corporation franchise and corporation income taxes, which decreased \$2,422,107, and in retail sales and use taxes, which decreased \$2,058,450 under collections for the corresponding period last year. These, together with other smaller decreases, were partially offset by increases in other revenues, resulting in the net total decrease of \$3,533,149.
