**NAVY DOCTORS CONQUER HEART AILS FROM RHEUMATIC FEVER; 95 PERCENT ON DUTY**

The specter of permanent heart impairment from rheumatic fever was largely dispelled today by the Navy, with the revelation that at least 95 percent of its personnel who contract the disease are returning to active duty, physically sound.

This statement was made by Rear Adm. George C. Thomas (MC), USN, Eleventh Naval District Medical Officer, who disclosed that the U. S. Naval Hospital at Corona, Calif., under the command of Capt. Harold Jensen (MC), USN, has been designated as the Navy's center in the United States for treatment of this ailment.

Responsible for the success of the program was the assignment by Vice Adm. Ross T. McIntire, USN, Chief of the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery, of some of the country's outstanding heart specialists to the Corona hospital.

Successful treatment is additionally insured by immediate

transport of afflicted personnel by "air ambulance" to Corona, coupled with ideal climatic conditions and latest physical equipment at the pre-war spa.

Specialists assigned to the center include Capt. W. H. Leake (MC), USN, medical officer in charge of the rheumatic fever unit, 609 N. Palm Drive, Beverly Hills, Calif.; Comdr. R. F. Solley (MC), USNR, New York City, and Lt. Comdr. George C. Griffith (MC), USNR, Philadelphia.

Heretofore considered highly injurious to the heart, the disease, when contracted, normally follows a severe streptococcal infection, and occurs in temperate or semi-arctic zones, according to Captain Leake.

Permanent damage to the heart is confined to about 8 percent of patients treated at the naval hospital, with not more than 3 percent of those afflicted unable to return to active duty, naval medical officers revealed.

Figures released early in the

war by the American Heart association indicated that some permanent cardiac injury occurs in approximately 25 percent of all rheumatic fever cases, it was said.

In the treatment of the disease, rest is of paramount importance, with patients allowed a 15-minute exercise period a day, Captain Leake emphasized. This is gradually increased, he said, over a period of several weeks to two hours a day. Later, a full week's work is permitted.

Transferred to the naval hospital annex at Spadra, Calif., for the final phase of therapy, the rheumatic fever patient is permitted to perform a four to six week routine of work of from six to eight hours a day under strict supervision, Captain Leake disclosed.

Medical officer in charge at Spadra is Comdr. Albert G. Wenzell, (MC), U.S.N. (Ret.), formerly of 113 N. Wilton place, Los Angeles. He now resides in San Diego.

Progressive reports on results of treatment of rheumatic fever will be made to the medical profession by the Navy Department's Bureau of Medicine and Surgery, Navy officials said.

**Veterans' Rights are Explained**

Veterans of World War II returning to California are assured of every protection of their rights to \$20 weekly readjustment allowance checks provided in the Servicemen's Readjustment Act, the G. I. Bill, it was announced by James G. Bryant, chief division of public employment offices and benefit payments.

The right to appeal from any decision made on a veteran's claim has been provided in the California Department of Employment procedure, he stated. If the veteran disagrees with any determination as to the number of weekly checks to which his service entitles him, his eligibility for allowances for a particular week or any decision affecting his rights, he may file an appeal which will be heard by a referee not associated with any local office, Bryant stated.

From the decision of the referee, the veteran may appeal his case direct to Richard Langdon, readjustment allowance agent for the Veterans Administration in California, and from the decision of the readjustment allowance agent, provision is

made for a final appeal direct to the Administrator of Veterans Affairs in Washington. Eligibility standards for readjustment allowances are similar to requirements to qualify for unemployment insurance benefits under the California Unemployment Insurance Act, Bryant explained.

Veterans who have had more than 90 days service after Sept. 16, 1940, or who are discharged for disability received in line of duty may qualify for readjustment allowance checks for 8 to 52 weeks for intermittent or continuous unemployment occurring up to two years after the end of the war, said Bryant.

It is not necessary that a veteran be unemployed or eligible for immediate allowances in order to file an application and establish his determination of entitlement, Bryant explained. By presenting his original discharge or certificate of service at one of the 78 offices of the California Department of Employment, a veteran may establish eligibility and avoid delay in receiving checks should he be unemployed at a later date, he stated.
