Redondo Beach Arena to Open On Saturday

One of the Southland's finest sport palaces, the Redondo Beach arena (formerly the Mandarin Ballroom) will open its doors Saturday night, March 17, with a star-studded wrestling show.

William White, president of the Ontario Model Car Race Club took top honors with an unofficial time of 102.85 miles per hour, on his first try. On second heat the time was 98.90 m. p. h., and on the third, 101.01 m. p. h. These were the best individual times for the day.

W. W. Woodward, Torrance club took second place, spur gear, with the car on which he holds second place world's record, with a time 96.77 m. p. h. Second heat was timed at 94.14, and third heat at 93.75 m. p. h.

Ed Hopkins, Valley Model Race Car Association, Seal Beach, was third with a time of 91.93 on his fourth heat. Other times on his car were: 87.80; 90.81; 91.37.

Other entrants were A. W. Finch, Torrance, who had a little trouble getting going but after a few adjustments were made, his car made a flat 75.00 m. p. h. This is a beautiful model, but Finch said he expected to get a lot more out of his car, after ironing out a few kinks.

Art Poore, Inglewood, with a home-built car, spur gear, was just breaking in his motor, which he built. He was having a little trouble with a sleeve but has nice prospects for the season. His time was 67.76 m. p. h.

The Mascot Car, of which no one at the meet would claim ownership, could not get started in 6 tries.

Bob and Bobby Strath, Jr., of the Carsonmart, had nice entries but were just ironing out troubles on their cars for forthcoming meets.

Also at the meet, Frank Tiscareno, owner of the Ideal Meat Market in Torrance and the Top-sy's night club in South Gate, expressed a desire to own a car which he would compete with at this year's world record meet, to be held at some date in June here in Torrance.

Leadoff man, Larry Sommers, was high with scores of 208, 223, 195-626. Sherrill Justice followed, way over his average, with 214, 179, 178-571. Jack Bassett scored with 170, 182, 189-541. Not to be outdone by his teammates, Ace Vaughn came up with a score of 183, 210, 210-612. Last but not least, the anchor man, Al Coast scored 168, 225, 210-603. This score may be the high score in the series.

Underground Aids A.A.F. Pilot in Escaping Nazis

A recent house guest of Judge and Mrs. Otto B. Willett, on leave from his base at Tucson, Ariz., where he is a pilot instructor, Lieut. Clifford Williams gave his hosts highlights of his experiences in his harrowing escape from the Nazis when his plane was shot down behind enemy lines. He was hidden by the underground for 16 weeks before his return to his base, with the Eighth Army Air Forces in England, he stated.
