HARRY B. LEWIS GETTING COVERS MAILED VE-DAY BY FLIER AT GERMAN BASE

Several envelopes mailed in Germany on V-E Day are being mailed to Executive Secretary Harry B. Lewis of Torrance Chamber of Commerce, ardent cover and stamp collector, by an Army lieutenant who was a flying student of Lewis many years ago.
The officer, First Lieut. Wil-lard H. Huffman, is planning to make his home in Torrance, and sent Lewis word that he mailed the several covers, stamped and censored, on official V-E Day, May 8, from Germany.
The flier said that he had found two Torrance pilots in his group, Lieut. B. P. Scott, 1537 Marcella ave., and Lieut. C. A. Over, 21816 S. Main st.
Both are well, he said, and make frequent flights into Germany.
Lewis was a captain in the Army Air Forces of World War I and prior to that in the Royal Air Force. He won the Distinguished Flying Cross, Croix-de-Guerre, British Distinguished Service Order, British General Service Order and the Mons Star.
He taught Lieutenant Huffman to fly at Toledo, Ohio, when he was connected with Williams Aircraft Corp., as vice president.

Hygiene Of The Skin Is Topic Of Dr. Swartout

The skin is the largest organ of the body and has more important functions than that of being a good looking surface, despite cream and lotion advertisements which stress attractiveness almost to the point of intimating that this social asset is the chief reason for having skin.
First, the skin is the protective covering for tissues beneath it. Second, it eliminates body wastes through perspiration. Third, it provides a place for nerves to spread out to give the sense of touch. The fourth and most important function, so far as life and health are concerned, is that of regulating body temperature and keeping it at a very nearly constant level no matter what the temperature of the surrounding air may be.
Skin is nourished by food materials brought to it by the blood and not by so-called foods that are smeared or rubbed on its surface. Therefore a healthy skin depends primarily on good general nutrition and good circulation of the blood.
In caring for the skin, both warm and cold baths have their place. Mild soap and warm water will remove the accumulations of residue from the continuous secretion of oil and perspiration which pour out on the skin surface. A cold bath or shower followed by a brisk rub-down is a good means of stimulating the circulation.
Moderation is the keyword in skin care. Sunburn, extreme heat and cold, very hot water, and abrasive soaps should be avoided if possible.
