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Victory Gardens

The end of hostilities in Europe will not decrease but rather will increase strains on United States food production. Forty-eight per cent of commercially canned vegetables and sixty-one per cent of canned fruits will go to Government uses this year. Your Victory garden will count more than ever in 1945!

Tomatoes
Tomato planting season is here. Pearson variety is probably the most reliable. Pearson might be a bit more tender than the other, so defer planting the latter varieties until late May or early June.

If you plan to stake them, set the plants two to two and one-half feet apart. Space rows about four feet. Tomatoes will produce well and require less work if allowed to grow without staking. For this system, set Pearson plants four feet apart with rows five feet, or Stoney or Beefsteaks six feet apart each way. Water the plants thoroughly when set. Follow with a second moderate watering in a week or ten days. Then no more water for two or three weeks.

Tobacco and Tomatoes
If you are a smoker, wash your hands in soap and water before handling tomato plants because your fingers can carry tobacco mosaic to the plants. Never apply tobacco leaf or stem dust to the plants or to tobacco stems to the soil. Nicotine sulphate is a chemical product which does not carry the virus. It is safe either in liquid or dust form.

Irrigation
For the first real irrigation, make furrows a foot to a foot and a half from the plants. Fill

the furrow and let it soak at least two feet deep. For the rest of the season move the furrow to two feet from the plants and let the water soak three to four feet deep. Tomatoes are deep rooted. Two-week to four-week intervals between waterings will be the rule. Sandy soils will dry out quicker than heavy soils and all soils will dry faster in clear, hot weather than in cloudy, cool damp days. Large plants will take water faster than small plants.

Pest Disease Control
Several dozen common weeds and ornamental plants, including dahlias, calla lilies, nasturtiums, carry spotted wilt-virus almost universally. The disease is carried by thrips which move in from infested plants. Kill the weeds as far away from the tomatoes as you can. Plant tomatoes as far from ornamentals as possible. Nicotine sulphate dust, or spray or sprays will help control thrips. This is the most dangerous insect to tomatoes. Next in importance is the tomato mite, which will cause the leaves to turn brown starting at the ground. Repeated sulphur dustings will control the mite. Another common trouble is the new worm, the big green horn worm. Both kinds will be controlled with repeated dustings of a stomach poison like calcium arsenate or cryolite.

Start pest and disease control program immediately after planting by applying nicotine sulphate, either as 10 per cent dust or a 1 to 800 spray. Repeat treatment at one or two week intervals to October. Start applications of cryolite or calcium arsenate dust either alone or in combination with sulphur by the time plants are a month old. Repeat these applications at two-week intervals for the rest of the season.

Shortages of insecticide materials may make recommended kinds hard to get. Manpower and paper bag shortages are preventing Victory gardening packaging of cryolite and calcium arsenate either separately or in combination with sulphur. Your dealer can get a fifty-pound sack of mixtures and you and your neighbors can divide it.
