### Private Water Firm Says Torrance Should Use Metropolitan Service

(Continued from Page 1-A) as to make this plan worthy of most serious consideration.

**Hopeful Plan**

He stated that his presentation of this plan and his recommendations for its adoption are based on a realistic hope that it might prove to be a permanent solution, but that at the worst it would be a logical and useful interim solution pending the working out of prolonged litigation and further study, as well as the determination of the post-war needs of the Basin following the inevitable adjustments which the end of the war will bring.

The Ways and Means Committee of the West Basin Groundwater Conservation Group is formed of various representatives of private water companies, industries, city officials and others in the area to study the problem arising out of lowering water tables in the basin and saline water intrusion.

They consist of Alexander, F. W. Curtis, chief engineer, Shell Oil Co., Wilmington refinery; W. C. Farquhar, refinery engineer, Richfield Oil Co., Watson refinery; O. A. Gienick, Manhattan Beach city engineer; Ben Haggott, president, Palos Verdes Water Co., Allan Harris, plant engineer, Johns-Mansville Corp.; Clyde Woodworth, city attorney of Inglewood, Manhattan Beach and El Segundo; William R. Barclay, city engineer, Redondo Beach.

The suggestion of Alexander that the public water company such as Torrance's Municipal Water District No. 1 discontinue use of its wells which draw from the West Basin supply feeding the private companies comes at a time when Walteria and the balance of Southwest Torrance are in the process of circulating petitions for formation of Water District No. 2.

The sentiment in Walteria is to use Metropolitan water, but it has been recommended that the system of the Quandt Pumping Co. be bought out at a fair price and be used as a starter for the city system.

Local water engineers have recommended that provision be made to provide Metropolitan water for all of Torrance, against the day when saline water intrusion makes the public wells unusable.

Torrance Municipal Water Department wells provided for use of the district consumers at a total of 11,006 acre feet of water during the past eight years, ranging from 1085 acre feet in 1937-38 to 1689 acre feet in 1944-45.

The cost of production of municipal water is \$9.65 per acre foot, while the cost of using Metropolitan water would be \$15 per acre foot. Thus, the cost of using the MWD water would add some \$6000 to the water bills of consumers of the district.

Seven private companies also supply Torrance with water in various areas, and should facilities be provided for formation of districts to use Metropolitan Water District water, it is estimated some \$900 to \$1000 additional acre feet of water would be needed.

### Union Revival Service Starts Here July 1

He recently returned from Chicago, where he had a part in a Soldier's Field meeting with 70,000 young people.

Bundy studied five years in the Canadian Academy of Music and the Toronto Conservatory of Music, also with William Shakespeare of Chicago while attending Moody Bible Institute. He has helped in various Bible conferences and travels extensively in both Canada and the United States in evangelistic work helping prominent evangelists. He has sung the gospel over 100 radio stations in this country and Canada.

Miss Harriet is a gifted evangelistic pianist and has played extensively in evangelistic meetings assisting both in the United States and Canada. She also plays the marimba and vibraharp.

### Tiny Cars Hit 108 Miles Per Hour on Torrance Track at Week End Meet

Dick McCoy, Pomona, with a spur-gear record-holding miniature racing car, took first place in the National Championship Model car meet in Torrance, held Saturday and Sunday at Plaza del Amo and Border ave., his car making 108 miles per hour. On a test run, he was unofficially timed at 111 miles per hour, just a fraction under the world's record.

Nearly 3000 persons milled about the new track, pronounced the finest in the United States, during the two days of racing. Winners and speeds of others are as follows: Prototype, Howard Lee, 97.98 miles per hour; Ronald Smith, 94.53; Jim Sode-man, 94.25; Allen Bacon, 93.07; Ray Hook, 89.19; Frank Jenkins, 86.08.

Spur Gear V-car, Dick McCoy, 108.43; Wilmer White, 105.97; Roy Kishiskian, 104.43; Lloyd Moler, 104.13; Charles Lamb, 102.33; Art Poore, 100.55; Clarence Benskins, 98.57; Carl Borchery, 98.36; and E. D. Hopkins, 95.49.

The speeds in all classes would have been approximately seven miles-per-hour higher if a standard 1/32 inch cable had been used. For safety sake, a large cable was used. One mishap marred the day when a bride broke on one of the tiny cars causing it to smash against the fence.

There were 46 entries from all over California, and two from out of the state.
