

State School Recreation Plan Is Due

The State Board of Education has created a department of recreation which soon will find reflection in every neighborhood and small town in California.

The Legislature five years ago authorized the recreation department, but set aside no funds for it. By the Governor's action, \$15,000 a year for a director and expenses soon will be available.

The new organization will attempt to co-ordinate youth recreational activities between the school, local government, and the community. The program is considered especially important in the light of the alarming growth of juvenile delinquency and the upset of home life caused by war conditions. School buildings and playgrounds already are being used for this purpose, but now there will be organized direction.

The schools of the State will offer their trained personnel where available. In many communities, Dr. Walter F. Dexter, state superintendent of public instruction pointed out, vacant lots can be used for playgrounds with little expense required. All new school buildings are of a type which has a community room suitable for classes in the daytime and various social activities in the evening and on holidays.

All these rooms have a fireplace in one end where Boy and Girl Scouts can cook or less experienced children can pop corn or toast marshmallows.



P. A. Cunningham Is Awarded Bronze Star

Patrick A. Cunningham, private, 1/c, son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Cunningham, of 1691 Gramercy ave., has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal for heroic achievement in the vicinity of Haitz, Germany.

An excerpt from his citation: "During operations near Haitz, on March 31, 1945, Company B came upon a road block covered by the fire of an enemy machine gun and supporting hostile riflemen. Private First Class Cunningham, a Company B radio man, moved courageously forward through the hostile fire to within thirty yards of the block when he was wounded in the left hand and left leg by fragments from an enemy thrown hand grenade. Despite his wounds, he crawled into a position close to the obstacle and opened direct pistol fire on the hostile machine gun nest. His heroic actions was of material aid to company elements in knocking out the enemy automatic weapon position."

Pfc. Cunningham is a brother of Pvt. Dan Cunningham, who gave his life for his country April, 1944, in the Southwest Pacific area. Other brothers are S/Sgt. Kenneth Cunningham, AAF, and James, of Duluth, Minn. Miss Kathleen, their sister, works at National Supply.

Stove Purchasers Warned by OPA On Certificates

Consumers and dealers holding stove purchase certificates on which deliveries have not yet been made, were warned today by the Office of Price Administration to exchange them for the new revised form before July 31, when the old issue will become invalid.

John B. Melvin, OPA rationing official, in voicing the warning, said that dealers would have an additional period, through August 15, in which to effect the exchange for the new form, while distributors will be allowed until August 22.

After these dates the war price and rationing boards will not accept the old form for exchange.

The homemaker's corner

Here's an appealing dessert with real individuality... plus high nourishing quality.

Peanut Butter Custard

2 eggs, slightly beaten
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla
1/4 tsp. nutmeg
1/4 cup peanut butter
2 cups Golden State Milk

1. Combine eggs, sugar, salt, vanilla, nutmeg and peanut butter.
2. Gradually add milk to egg mixture. Pour into custard cups. Place in pan of hot water and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 45 minutes. Serves 6.

Try these Helpful Hints

A bottle of sugar syrup kept in the refrigerator during summer months makes it easy to quickly prepare punch for unexpected guests.

Onion odor can't be washed off hands with warm water and soap, as soap sets the odor. First wash hands in cold running water, or rub them with lemon juice or vinegar, or with salt and cold water. Then, warm water and soap will do the job.

Soak vegetables in cold water to which a little lemon juice has been added to freshen them quickly.

To prevent milk sticking to a pan in which it is heated, first rinse the pan with cold water.
