Pending statement from the county counsel, the Board of Education last night revoked its decision to increase salaries of high school football and athletic coaches.

It was pointed out by Mayor J. Toll, board member, that if coaching was part of the teacher's assignment, it might be illegal to pay them for overtime, even if the coaching was done after regular school days.

As football coaches represented by the Physical Education Association threatened a "strike," the board last week approved a motion to pay coaches \$1.25 an hour for overtime.

A SUBSTITUTION
To change a recipe from soda and sour milk to baking powder and sweet milk, keep this rule in mind: One half-teaspoon of soda equals two teaspoons of baking powder. 
