Tournament Of Roses Promises To Be Finest Equestrian Show

Colorado Street will be running competition to Equestrian Shows the world over this coming New Year's Day when a hundred and fifty or more of California's finest riders and horses appear in the 57th Annual Tournament of Roses Parade.

Leon Kingsley, Chairman of the Equestrian Committee for the Tournament of Roses Association, announced yesterday that twenty six signed entry blanks have been received to date from individuals and organizations in the Southern California area. Of these entries several are riding groups that use ten to thirty riders and horses.

The Contra Costa County Sheriffs Posse will again participate in the parade this coming New Year's Day. John A. Miller, Secretary of this riding group, has announced that their posse will consist of twenty-four to twenty-six horses made up of palominos, blacks, pintos and chestnuts.

Long Beach riders will be ably represented by the Long Beach Mounted Police Patrol, a group of twenty to twenty-five, who wear matched costumes and use matched silver equipment on their mounts. The members wear black satin shirts trimmed in white, striped pants, black cowboy boots and white felt hats.

Victor H. York of Whittier, California will use a saddle on his mount designed by himself which shows, by silver and leather engraving, replicas of the original oil wells and refineries in each oil producing state of the United States.

The Turner family of Long Beach California, consisting of Jack, Carl, Jean, Beatrice, Cecile and Carla Jean will ride six dark gold Palomino Hackney stallions. Their saddle trimmings are done in hand etched silver showing famous Indian heads along the Santa Fe Trail.

Facilities For Training Vets To Be Enlarged

Facilities for training disabled California war veterans in remunerative trades to make them independent in civilian life are to be installed at the State Veterans Home at Yountville, Napa County, thanks to the generosity of the Odd Fellow and Rebekah lodges of California.

Announcement of the project was made here today by Irvin R. Snyder of Los Angeles, state commander of the American Legion, who said approximately half of the \$250,000 cost has already been raised and that plans for constructing and equipping an occupational therapy building are being drafted by State Architect Anson Boyd at Sacramento.

Snyder described the project as "the finest possible type of practical assistance to our returning service men" and declared it would benefit a group of veterans who for the most part would not receive occupational training in any other quarter.

He pointed out that veterans participating will receive medical treatment at the same time and after recovery "will be able to return to their home communities fully prepared for self-supporting, useful civilian life."

Snyder called attention to the fact that a ten-year prior residence is required for membership in the State Home, under present law, and that the occupational training in the immediate postwar period will thus be available only to World War II veterans who were citizens of California before entering the service.

May Extend Vets' FHA Loan Maturity Dates

Through the efforts of Congressman Gordon L. McDonough, legislation has been introduced amending the present National Housing Act so that the maturity date of mortgages on homes built or purchased by veterans may be extended for periods equivalent to their periods of service in the military or naval forces.

Under the present law, national insurance can not be issued on mortgages extending over a period of 20 or 25 years. Since all FHA loans are insured by national insurance under the Federal Housing Act, no extensions can be granted on these long term mortgages. The proposed legislation H.R. 4256, will provide relief to both men and women veterans and was introduced at the request of many veterans facing this specific problem.



The homemaker's corner

Milk in cooking works a two-way magic. It adds smoothness and richer taste in nearly every recipe . . . and it steps up nourishment with its fine supply of protein, minerals and vitamins. Here are a couple of milk-rich dishes the family will approve.

Cream of Corn Soup

- 2 stalks celery
- 1/4 medium green pepper
- 1/4 small onion, chopped
- 1 #2 can corn
- 1 full can Golden State Evaporated Milk
- 1/2 tsp. salt

1. Cook celery, green pepper, and onion in 1 1/2 cups salted water for 20 minutes. Add corn and continue cooking for another 5 minutes. 2. Puree vegetables. Add milk and salt. Bring to boiling point and serve immediately. Serves 6.

Meat Balls and Vegetables

- 1 pound ground beef
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1 tbsp. A-1 sauce
- 1 tbsp. minced onion
- 1 egg, beaten
- 2 tsp. shortening
- 2 cups hot water
- 4 medium potatoes—cut in 1/2" slices
- 4 medium carrots—cut in 1/2" slices
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 tbsp. flour
- 1 cup Golden State Milk

1. Combine meat, salt, pepper, A-1 Sauce, onion, and egg. Roll into eight medium balls. Brown evenly in hot shortening. 2. Add water, vegetables, and additional salt. Cover and cook slowly until vegetables are tender. (45-50 minutes.) 3. Arrange vegetables and meat balls on a platter. Mix flour and part of milk into a smooth paste; gradually add remaining milk. Add to stock and cook, stirring constantly until thickened. 4. Pour gravy over meat balls and vegetables, garnish with chopped parsley. Serves 4.
