

For this corruptible must put on incorruption, and this mortal must put on immortality." "Jesus said unto her, I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live: . . . Then they took away the stone from the place where the dead was laid. And Jesus lifted up his eyes, and said, Father, I thank thee that thou hast heard me. . . . And when he thus had spoken, he cried with a loud voice, Lazarus, come forth. And he that was dead came forth, bound hand and foot with graveclothes: . . . Jesus saith unto them, Loose him, and let him go."

Mary Baker Eddy writes in "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures": "Jesus said substantially: 'He that believeth in me shall not see death.' That is, he who perceives the true idea of Life loses his belief in death. He who has the true idea of good loses all sense of evil, and by reason of this is being ushered into the undying realities of Spirit."

Plan Expansion Of Red Cross College Council

Possible formation of a Los Angeles County Council of Red Cross college units—consolidating the ten institutions operating campus Red Cross activities—today was being studied by a committee of pro-tem officers named at a special meeting held at chapter house auditorium, 1200 S. Vermont ave.

Named as temporary chairman was Miss Beverly Hastings of Santa Monica Junior College, with Miss Margot Rouseyrol, Immaculate Heart College, and Miss Betty Rossbach, Pasadena Junior College, also appointed to the by-laws committee.

The extension plan would add Santa Monica J. C., Pasadena J. C., Glendale J. C. and Long Beach J. C. to the Los Angeles chapter's council made up of U.C.L.A., U.S.C., Compton J. C., Immaculate Heart, Mount St. Mary's and George Pepperdine College.

"We are seeking to form a college unit group into a county division to facilitate the operation of Red Cross programs on the various campuses," Miss Hastings declared.

Key speakers during the assembly yesterday included: Bowen McCoy, Los Angeles chapter manager; Mrs. Alice Carr Miller, of the Home Service Department, who gave information pertaining to the Red Cross services available to World War II veterans returning to their college courses; and Mrs. Julius Jacoby, recently appointed by the Los Angeles chapter to serve as liaison representative between Volunteer Special Service and the college units.



Check and Double-check
