Appeal For More Red Cross Workers By Torrance Branch Chairman

"The war is over for some but not for Red Cross and not until every service man and woman and members of their families are cared for. Above all, let us not forget the boys who are hospitalized."

So said Mrs. Helen Miller, chairman, Torrance Branch, American Red Cross, in an urgent appeal to Torrance women for more workers in Red Cross activities. She continued:

"All branches of Red Cross are continuously busy. For example, more than 5000 wires were sent from Los Angeles headquarters last month. Of these a proportionate number were from and for Torrance service men and their families served through Branch Headquarters.

"For the past four years, Torrance women have been volunteering from one to several days each week to maintain an efficient service in each of the various departments.

"Mrs. Marie Beale, staff assistants are always available to answer office calls and refer inquiring service men to the various sources of Red Cross service.

"Mrs. Julia Neelands, canteen chairman and her staff, have earned the praise and admiration of all for their splendid work which entails early morning routine and late night duty when they are called to the harbor to meet the troops arriving from overseas. In addition to the food and hot coffee these ladies serve, their sincere words of cheer and welcome contribute greatly to the morale of the returning veterans.

"Home Service Chairman, Mrs. Edith Erickson, and her assistants Mrs. Miriam Forkum and the newly installed Mrs. Marcia Menmuir, have been busy arranging furloughs and furlough extensions, sending telegrams, delivering messages, and performing numerous services for the men and their families.

"Mrs. Phyrne Laughon, motor corps chairman, and her assistants stand by always ready to drive patients to hospitals or to other necessary destinations as well as to transport Red Cross workers and materials wherever they may be required.

"Red Cross is now calling for more help. The Home Service department needs five additional workers. In addition, 15 registrants are required now for training for a Home Service Class to begin at once. Will you call at Headquarters, 1345 El Prado and leave your name, or telephone Torrance 1524 so that an interview may be arranged?"

"Even one-half day each week in this fine volunteer service will relieve the strain and enable us to continue to serve our boys."


