### Eight New Firms To Employ 1200 In Hawthorne

A new industrial center is to be developed in Hawthorne by eight firms, L. J. Gilmeister, secretary-treasurer of the Hawthorne Chamber of Commerce, has announced. He formerly was secretary of Torrance Chamber of Commerce.

They have acquired 49 acres out of a tract of 62 acres just beyond the city limits, Gilmeister said.

This is the largest concurrent movement of concerns to locate in the community, he added.

The eight plants are expected to employ about 1200 people.

The Central Cabinet Company will occupy three acres, and plans to start by hiring 100 persons, with another 100 added to the payroll within a short time.

Ten acres will be occupied by the Mission Water Heater Company, which expects to hire 250 persons at the start.

The Marshall Air Frame Company also will occupy 10 acres, the Quality Frame Company, three acres, The Van De Kamp cold storage plant, four acres, the Miller Foundry Company, three acres, the Hiatt Furniture Manufacturing Company, three acres, and the Moody Mattress Company, 10 acres.

J. A. Meade, 1035 No. Hawthorne ave., Los Angeles, of the Austin Securities Company, will be the owner from whom the land was acquired.

The land is bounded by 124th st., El Segundo and Crenshaw blvds., and Yukon ave.

### New Boulder Power Link In Service

Forging another electric power link between Boulder Dam and an expanding Southern California, a new Southern California Edison Company major transmission line has been placed in service, according to W. C. Mullendore, president of the company.

"The new line, the Edison Company's third major 220,000 volt transmission line connecting with the Boulder Power Plant, is 130 miles in length and has a capacity of 125,000 kilowatts," Mr. Mullendore said.

"Construction of the line was begun under special war-time authorization and its completion adds substantially to power supply reserves for the Southern California area."

"The establishment of a new major Edison substation on a 30 acre site a few miles south of Colton also is a part of this project. This new station, named Highgrove for the community near which it is located, will be completed soon. Cost of the line and substation is about \$4,500,000."

"The energy carried by the new transmission line is generated at Boulder Dam by units installed for the Metropolitan Water District and Basic Magnesium, Inc. Peace-time reallocation of generating capacity at Boulder permits the use of the units."

"Existing transmission facilities owned by the Metropolitan Water District are used jointly by Edison and the Metropolitan Water District to the Hayfield pumping plant on the Metropolitan Aqueduct, about 175 miles from Boulder. From Hayfield, the new Edison line was built across 130 miles of desert, mountains, foothills, and valley to the Edison Company's Chino substation. As soon as the Highgrove substation is completed, it will be connected to the new line."

"Contract for construction of the line and substation was held by Stone and Webster Engineering Corporation. The contractors established three field construction camps and at the peak of activities had between 500 and 600 men on the job. The line includes 500 steel towers, which required about 2,880 tons of steel, and 387 miles of steel reinforced aluminum conductor."

"Now that the war is over, the line still has major importance of saving fuel oil, still a scarce commodity, and providing Southern California with more hydro-electric power for its continued development."

### Health And Sewage Topic Of Article

Though a cesspool or a septic tank might take care of the wastes from your house, a sewer would be more desirable. But even if you had these conveniences available, you would want to be able to call on somebody to inspect them to see if they were operating properly. So, in addition to a plumber, modern life has made the sanitary engineer and inspector necessary.

A cesspool, or even a sewer, properly installed and periodically inspected, is not enough to put an end to the problem of your bathroom wastes, if they are added to similar wastes from many other houses. Unless still more sanitary engineering and still more attention from public health people are applied to the problem, our streams or our coastal waters eventually become fouled, imperiling our health.

It is possible to treat these wastes in such a way as to take away much or all of their unpleasantness and their menace to health. There are treatment plants in operation in our community to prove this. One that gives the most modern and complete form of treatment known is located in San Gabriel, serving three neighboring cities. A plant of this type could easily be constructed to take care of the wastes from a population even larger than that of our entire metropolitan community. In so far as the disposal of these wastes concerns our welfare, good health and the enjoyment of our natural surroundings can be bought if we are willing to pay the price.

### Labor United Behind Drive For Clothing

Leaders of the nation's great labor organizations have pledged most support to the Victory Clothing Collection for Overseas Relief, Henry J. Kaiser, national chairman today notified the Rev. Ronald L. Memmurr local chairman of the drive.

The Victory clothing drive is going well in Torrance, the Rev. Mr. Memmurr said, and Torrance should be one of the first to reach the required quota. Cast off or usable clothing, shoes, blankets, underwear and other items may be left at the following locations:

- The Christian Church, Guild Hall of the Evangelical Church.
- Grand Theatre, Torrance Theatre.
- A. & P. Store, Safeway Store.
- American Red Cross office, Schuitz & Peckham Ford agency.

William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, said that "although a magnificent job was done in the Spring collection by which twenty-five million people overseas were clothed, the drive needed in this war-devastated world is greater than ever. A. F. L. men and women may be counted upon to contribute generously in this present effort to save lives now endangered by lack of adequate clothing."

Phillip Murray, president of the Congress of Industrial Organizations, in his endorsement of the humanitarian project, acclaimed the Victory Clothing Collection as an opportunity to help the newly liberated people to freedom by providing clothing for their physical needs.

"Such participation will once again illustrate the desire of the working men and women of this country to cement the fraternal bonds between them and the working men and women all over the world," said Mr. Murray.
