## Candidate for City Council In Steel Industry 30 Years; Now Plant Manager at IDECO

Candidate Jackson makes no claim of being a politician. In fact, his only experience in public office consists of serving as a member of the school board at Columbus, Ohio. But he does have all the qualifications of a capable executive with 30 years' practical training and the experience of a man who has worked his way from the bottom by hard work and study. He is interested in Torrance because it is the home of his family and he is willing to devote his time and talent for the betterment of this community.
