

### Industry, Private Water Producers Urged To Join West Basin Group

Directors of the newly organized West Basin Water Association met in regular session at the Inglewood Council Chamber Thursday, March 21, with president Ben Haggott, presiding. C. F. Mau, California Water Service Company, accepted his appointment to the executive committee and Gilbert J. Potts, Gardena, was elected to fill one vacancy.

Serving also on the executive committee are O. A. Gierlich, vice president; Ben Haggott, president; Allan Harris, Johns-Manville Products Corporation; and Fred Powell, Standard Oil Company. At the suggestion of L. W. Barclay, director from the City of Redondo Beach, the remaining vacancy will be held open so that a representative from the Hawthorne-Inglewood area may be appointed when these two municipalities join the association.

It was the unanimous opinion of the directors that industrial, private and municipal producers who have not joined the association to date must think of the good of the district as a whole and further, that even if the cities join separately or with the entire West Basin, the cost would be the same. In obtaining a supplemental water supply it is apparent that any area, by joining in cooperation with the district as a whole, will be at less expense in acquiring feeder lines, thus making the cost cheaper from that point alone.

Truancy from school is an increasingly common phenomenon in Los Angeles, according to school authorities. But the school system is trying to deal with it in a new way.

For one thing, they are trying to find out why boys and girls play hooky. Counselors John Weber and Mrs. Mollie Kerr are particularly on the job in the old Los Angeles high school building on Fort Moore Hill. Field workers, engaged in rounding up the strays, operate from the same headquarters.

## SAFEWAY Spring Produce Parade

Use Spring Produce To Pep Up Appetites

Here are some of my favorite ways with the just-arrived fruits and vegetables.

**WILTED SPINACH**  
Wash young tender spinach well; use leaves into small pieces. Place in a hot serving dish or salad bowl. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and add a few minutes to wilt slightly. Heat together 2 or 3 tablespoons bacon drippings, 1/4 cup butter and 2 tablespoons of melted sugar. When mixture begins to boil, pour over spinach and toss lightly to mix. Garnish with chopped green onion, hard-cooked egg slices and radishes. Serve as soon. Serves 6.

**GLAZED SPRING CARROTS**  
We like to serve these with broiled spring lamb chops.  
Scrub 1 1/2 lb. 20 small young carrots with a stiff brush. Cook in a small amount of boiling salted water until tender; drain. Melt 4 tablespoons butter or margarine and 2 tablespoons sugar in a frying pan. Add carrots and cook slowly, turning and basting frequently, about 10 minutes or until glazed and shiny in appearance. Serve hot. Serves 6.

**SPRING UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE**  
Arrange 3 cups diced chubbak in a well-greased 8" x 8" x 2" cake pan. Sprinkle with 1/4 cup sugar combined with 2 tablespoons corn starch. (1 lb. to 1 1/2 lb. half brown sugar and half groundnut.) Mix up your favorite plain or sponge cake recipe and pour over chubbak. Bake in moderate (350° F.) oven 20 to 40 minutes or until done. Invert on rack to cool. To serve, cut in squares and top with whipped cream.
