Co-Chairmanship Announced For National Food Collection

The Rev. Ronald J. Menmuir, pastor of First Christian church, and Harry B. Lewis, president of the Lions Club, have been named co-chairmen for Torrance on the Emergency Food Collection, according to word from Lee Marshall, executive director, in New York.

However, since the Rev. Menmuir is a member of the Lions Club, Lewis said that he will turn the task over to him, asking full cooperation of the Lions members.

Through Lions International, Lewis was asked to take the chairmanship, in Torrance and accepted. Later, the Ministerial Union of Torrance entered the picture and the Rev. Menmuir accepted the chairmanship for the churches.

National headquarters at 100 Maiden Lane, New York City, then named both Menmuir and Lewis as co-chairmen.

Lewis complimented the work of Menmuir in handling the church emergency food collection, in making his decision.

Writing to each Menmuir and Lewis, Executive Director Marshall said:

"I want to express the sincere appreciation of National Chairman Henry A. Wallace and myself for your willingness to serve as chairman of your community for the Emergency Food Collection."

"National Chairman Wallace said last week: 'We are very anxious to receive not only gifts of food suitable for shipment overseas but also contributions in cash. The sorting, packing and transportation of foods are fairly expensive and must ultimately be paid for out of the funds collected. In addition, it should be remembered that more food can be obtained for a given amount of money if it can be bought centrally and in large quantities.'"

"It should accordingly be re-

membered that cash contributions are preferred, although the secondary goal of the Emergency Food Collection is the collection of food canned in tin.

"Thank you again for your service to this important humanitarian program and good luck to your local program."


